Annulled-Bisbee to Have Sunday Mail Distribution.

Postmaster Cassidy won his contention for service to Bisbee postoffice box patrons for Sunday distribution of mail. Such announcement was contained in announcement received from Washington, under which the distribution will be commenced on next Sunday.

In this matter Bisbee enjoys a distinction entertained by no other city in the country.

Another announcement received last night by Postmaster Cassidy was announcement of the order for an examination for postmaster for Warren, to have been held on the 28th. Under the order which recently became effective this office was put in the presidential class, making it appointive.

Captain C. B. Kelton, member of the legislature and widely known in the county, left Douglas yesterday for Gettysburg, where he will attend the jubilee reunion of the Blue and the Gray next week. Captain Kelton is a veteran of the Gray. He enlisted on the 22d of May 1862 in the 52d Maryland and served throughout the war with distinction. He was wounded at Gettysburg during the great engagement of July 3, which date practically saw the end of his active service.
