The Review's Special Magazine Meets with Public's Immediate Endorsement

The generous reception extended to the Mining Edition Magazine of The Review exceeds in its general expression even the measure of approval which the publishers looked for. Owing to the difficulties that would have confronted the Post Office authorities in handling the thousands of pounds of additional matter on Sunday distribution of the magazine was limited to the Warren district where subscribers received copies from the regular carriers. In cases where the name of the sender appeared on these "short postage" copies, Postmaster Cassidy endeavored to communicate with the senders. He asked The Review last night to announce that the correct postage for the magazine is eight cents.

DOUGLAS MAN SLAYS HIS FATHER-IN-LAW

go in when he was confronted by some one. He says he could not see who it was. He says he was struck with a stick of some kind and shows a swollen wrist in proof of this. After he was hit his assailant, according to his story, kept advancing on him and striking at him. He backed off a number of steps and fired. After the first shot his assailant again advanced and Felker fired again.

Felker resided in Douglas for nine months and has been employed as a pumpman and in care of the water service at the Copper Queen smelter. He came here from Oklahoma. He is 38 years old.

Mrs. Felker tells a different story from that of her husband, saying that at the time of the shooting there was no words being spoken and that her father was not in any way molesting Felker. She says the shooting was without cause; that her husband had been given to jealousy and that on the morning of the shooting they had quarreled and he had left the house and went to the city and was not heard from again until he appeared about midnight and without warning pulled his gun and shot her father to death.

Walker was shot twice with a .38 calibre revolver, either one of which would have been fatal, the first having pierced the aorta and the second passing through the heart, breaking the backbone and lodging just beneath the skin in the back.

CANANEA, Son, Mex., Oct. 6.—General Venustiano Carranza, now at Hermosillo, has postponed his visit to Cananea, which was to have been made beginning Saturday, on account of being indisposed. Preparations for the big event are being continued and if anything like the reception tendered the general will be on a greater scale than originally planned.

Work upon the triumphal arches in Juarez avenue has been commenced. There will be quite a number of them representing the various civic bodies, societies and clubs, besides the foreign colonies. The latter have been invited to participate in the affair and have responded in a liberal manner. Gov. Carranza will probably come to Cananea on the 11th or 12th.
