

DULLEST DAY IN MANY YEARS

Practically No Trading Yesterday—Undertone Appeared Firm—Railroads Give Discouraging Reports

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—Trading all but ceased today on the stock exchange. It is necessary to go back a quarter of a century to find records of a duller market. Most of the time the ticker is silent.

Not one of the favorite stocks moved up or down so much as a point. When five dreary hours of trading had come to an end, it was found that the total business was 57,300 shares.

There has not been a day as dull since the blizzard in 1888, when trading on the exchange was practically closed. On March 12 of that year a total of 15,500 was all that was recorded.

The best that could be said of today's market was that the undertone was firm. At the start there was some irregularity, with evidence of renewed heaviness among the metal stocks, but the small early losses were soon recovered. In most cases the leaders made fractional advances. Holders of long stock derived some encouragement from the markets firmness in the face of discouraging news.

The leading railroads of the east presented figures showing curtailment in earnings. The figures for the first two months of the present year, it was said by President Delano of the Wabash gave less encouragement than any results since 1910, when a 10 per cent increase in rates was denied. He declared the operating income decreased.

Residents on Watch to Nab Lawless Persons in District

Residents of South Bisbee will call the attention of the authorities today to the acts of lawless persons who are endangering lives in that community by the unlawful use of firearms. For two weeks past, gun or pistol shots have alarmed residents and several narrow escapes are reported.

On last Wednesday and Friday nights, bullets struck the rocks in front of the homes of R. T. Edmunds and Walter Brookbank. The shots were fired from near the school house. Mrs. Peters had just entered her home Friday night, when bullets lodged near her home. Women and children in South Bisbee are afraid to go out in the streets at night. The shooting takes place after dark and so identification of the offenders has been impossible. A close watch will be kept hereafter in the neighborhood and severe punishment will overtake the guilty ones when caught.

HONOR MEMORY OF MARTYRS


