COMMENT ON HAIGLER CASE

Street Talk Yesterday Retained the Tone of That Heard Immediately After the Inquest—Surprise Expressed

Comment about the city yesterday with reference to the order for grant of bail to Roy Haigler, was varied. For the most part, the decision of the Supreme court in the matter appeared unexpected.

Many wondered yesterday if Haigler upon being granted bond would return to the city. Many also wondered if he could secure the amount of bond the court had considered likely to fix. Doubt was expressed in regard to both matters.

Sentiment has greatly changed in respect to Haigler in the district since his removal to jail from the presence of the coroner. Evidence at that time introduced threw a different light upon the tragedy in which he was implicated than had previously prevailed and sentiment that rather inclined toward Haigler, veered about. The announcement that he had been ordered admitted to bail, reopened the discussion of the case on the streets yesterday, when the burden of comment was along the line of that immediately after the inquest, when there was considerable feeling expressed.

YOUNG MEN HELD TO FACE TRIAL

Auto Appropriation Case Comes Up Tomorrow—Building Permit Law Being Enforced—Court Business

Two men were arraigned before Judge High yesterday charged with disturbing the peace. They pleaded guilty and received a fine of \$5 each, which both paid.

In the case of the City against Bane and Tarrant, contractors, the defendants plead guilty and were fined \$10 each, which they paid. The charge against them was for building a residence on Brewery Gulch within the fire limits without first obtaining a building permit.

The Belgian, who was arrested on Monday for using obscene language in a public place was tried and fined \$10, which he paid. Gilbert Fort, Fred Sheldon and Lawrence Kelley, who were arrested in Douglas, upon advice of officers here, for the appropriation of an auto on Christmas day, were brought here to be arraigned yesterday. They were placed under bonds of \$200 each and accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Cannon returned to Douglas yesterday to try to raise the money. Should they fail they will be returned to jail here. Their trial is set for 2 p. m. Friday. S. P. Doan, of Douglas, represents the prosecution and Col. Bob French and Judge Ross the defendants.

DIES IN OLD INDIAN HOME

Friends Here of Mrs. Florence Brown, Recently of Lowell, Saddened by News Received of Her Death

The many friends of Mrs. Florence Brown, who formerly resided in Uper Lowell, have learned with sorrow of her death in Eckhart, Ind., on December 26. The Eckhart Truth has the following:

"Florence R., widow of Daniel Brown, 52 years old, died at 1 o'clock Friday night at the General Hospital. The deceased had been in the hospital since September 11, last, at which time she returned from Arizona, where she had lived for nine years. She had undergone several operations. Yesterday afternoon she was stricken with hemorrhage and death followed.

The deceased was born near Pierceton, Ind., March 2, 1861. She moved to Warsaw at an early age with her parents and in 1895 came to this city. She was married in 1879, her husband dying in 1890 of typhoid fever, since when she has been living with no children. Beside her husband, she was preceded in death by four children, Edith, 16 years old and Mrs. Myrtle Sellers, daughters, died in Eckhart.

The deceased is survived by two sons, Carl and Ralph, of Bisbee, Arizona; brothers, Nelson Froestene of Princeton and Albert of Bisbee; and sisters, Mrs. Edna Hunt of Chicago, Mrs. Frances Reisman of Richmond, Ind., and Miss Edith Firestone of Denver, Colo.

The remains will be shipped tomorrow.

CORYELL WINS HIS ACQUITTAL

Morenci Resident Killed Smith in Self Defense, Is Verdict of Coroner's Jury—Ugly Charge Is Hinted

MORENCI, Dec. 31.—R. S. Coryell, before Judge Fally was acquitted of the charge of murdering last week a young man named Smith, who had recently come to town. A plain case of self-defense on the part of Coryell was shown by the attorneys of the accused, and Prosecuting Attorney Horton recommended that the verdict be as rendered.

It was proven that the dead man had threatened the life of the accused being angry because of having been ejected from the Coryell home, where he had been a roomer for some time, and that later he went to the place of labor of the defendant, and attempted the latter's life, having drawn a knife and attempted to stab Coryell, before being slain by a pistol bullet. For some time Coryell had been expecting the attack, the dead man having repeatedly made threats of taking his Coryell's life. It was reported although not admitted as evidence at the trial, that Smith had attempted the assault of a neighbor of Coryell's family.

RODEY WILL MAKE RACE FOR CONGRESS

Former Delegate, Now U. S. District Attorney in Alaska, Makes Announcement

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Dec. 31.—Judge Bernard S. Rodey, formerly Republican delegate in Congress from New Mexico, later district judge for several years in Porto Rico and until recently United States District Attorney of Alaska, with headquarters at Nome, has announced his candidacy for the nomination for Congress in the Republican ticket in 1914.

The information that he will be a candidate for Congress is derived from letters received by friends here and at Santa Fe. The news will not be a surprise to Judge Rodey's friends, since it has been no secret that he would again become active in New Mexico politics, following his retirement from the federal service. Judge Rodey, who was here recently, for a brief visit to his family, on his way from Alaska to Washington, to confer with political leaders, is expected to return to Albuquerque this week. He will open law offices immediately, it is said, and assume the practice of his profession.
