TERRAZAS' FRIENDS ARE INTERESTED

Fate of Luis Terrazas, Son of Wealthy Ex-Governor of Chihuahua, Is Unknown to Citizens of the Pass City

Felix Martinez of El Paso Offers Friendly Help to Bryan in Behalf of Captive Mexican.—Interest in Outcome

EL PASO, March 5.—The case of Luis Terrazas, whose life, in effect, has been declared forfeited unless 500,000 pesos are forthcoming by Saturday, is at a standstill.

Felix Martinez, prominent politically in this section, is said to have telegraphed Bryan, inviting him to use his good office in behalf of the younger Terrazas.

There has been assurance from some of Carranza's friends that the attitude of the Constitutionalists leaders that he need not supply the information to the United States concerning the British subject be modified.

BRYAN TO COLQUITT.

Passes the Buck to Texas Governor in Matter of Vergara Kidnapers.

DALLAS, Tex., March 6.—Governor Colquitt will make requisition on both Federal and rebel authorities in the State of Nuevo Leon, Coahuila, for the return of four armed men who are held responsible for the kidnaping of the missing American ranchman, Clemente Vergara.

The Governor made this announcement tonight, after he had received a telegram from Secretary of State Bryan saying that the question of requisition was one of justice, not of diplomacy, and concerned only the local authorities.

General Joaquin Maas, Federal commander of the northern zone, notified the Governor yesterday that he had ordered arrests of the men wanted.

BENICIA PAYS THE FREIGHT.

Gets Bid of Army of Unemployed by Paying Fares.

BENICIA, Cal., March 6.—Benicia handled its unemployed problem today by transporting 1,374 jobless men of two factions, headed by Major Thorne and General Kelley, to Sacramento, by the expedient of paying full fare for each man on the train.

FAVOR NAVAL HOLIDAY.

Interstate Commerce Committee of Lower Body Goes on Record by a Vote of Thirteen to Three Favoring Legislation Asked by Wilson. Senate Puts Off Action on Matter Until Arguments Can Be Heard Next Week

WASHINGTON, March 6.—Initial steps for the repeal of the exemption clause in the Panama Canal act, as requested by the president were taken in Congress today when the House committee on Interstate Commerce reported favorably on the bill to strike out the provision.

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MISQUOTED, MAYBE, SAYS CARRANZA

May Have Statements to Make Later on International Questions—Wants It Understood He Is Leaving

Gratified with Demonstrations—May Remain Several Days in Agua Prieta—Most of Trip in Automobile

DOUGLAS, March 6.—(Special)—General Venustiano Carranza and his party arrived in Agua Prieta shortly after 5 o'clock this evening from Naco, the trip overland having been accomplished without incident.

General Carranza left Naco on horseback and entered Agua Prieta mounted—but in between he occupied an automobile. He took to the latter a short way out of Naco and enjoyed its comforts to within a mile of Agua Prieta, when he resumed the saddle and rode at the head of his guard in and through the town to the plaza.

From the town limits to the plaza, the progress of the chief and his escort was between double ranks of Constitutional soldiers. Back of these was the populace, and a great many visiting Americans, drawn across the line by curiosity. Also there were some hundreds of Mexican visitors from interior points, over 300 having come by special train this morning from Nacoart alone.

About the plaza there were grouped many school children and other citizens. The scene was very similar to that witnessed at Naco yesterday afternoon, except that there was a larger assemblage of Mexicans and a corresponding greater amount of enthusiasm. A program was carried out by the school children, following a speech of welcome and brief reply made by Carranza.

Subsequently General Carranza retired to the Hotel Amaya, where he held a public reception. Several hundred persons attended this, passing before the Constitutional chief and shaking hands with him. Still later there was a dance in the hotel ball room, in which Gen. Carranza was a pleased onlooker, surrounded by friends and conversing with these.

"You may deny for me, absolutely," said General Carranza, shortly before retiring for the night, "and all reports to the effect that my trip toward Chihuahua will terminate here in Agua Prieta. We are going to Chihuahua. There is every reason why we should—none why we should not."

"I would say that the enthusiasm with which the people have greeted us thus far on the way has been most gratifying and has demonstrated that the cause for which we stand is growing constantly stronger. I think that these demonstrations have opened the eyes of many who as to true and lasting patriotism are behind this movement."

"As to questions of international character, I must beg to be excused from discussion at this immediate time. All that has gone out recently as to my attitude has not been correct—I have perhaps been misinterpreted in some statements, but as to this there will be a more fitting time for discussion. I shall perhaps remain in Agua Prieta several days. There are important conferences to be held here and matters of state attended to."

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CARRANZA'S FUTURE

WASHINGTON, March 6.—Administration leaders assert, the political future of Carranza depends on the Benton incident, for should the Constitutionalists triumph, Carranza will be elected and there are strong indications that England will refuse to recognize him unless the Benton incident is settled.

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
