MANY ARE COMING IN.

Trains into the city the last week have carried larger numbers of people than at any time since around the first of the year. There is no apparent cause for the incoming, further than that the new arrivals consider the city a promising locality and are here, in many cases, to remain until openings afford for employment or investment. Many families have been among the recent arrivals. With all there is a difficulty in the finding of desirable accommodations, the city is being crowded for all kinds of quarters.

The last steps to this end are expected to be taken in the approaching trial at Phoenix.
