WAR QUESTION IS RAISED BY BONAPARTE

IN CONSIDERATION TOLLS EXEMPTION QUESTION—LEGAL VIEWPOINT COMES UP

Bonaparte contended that the rules of construction required that the Hay-Francisco treaty be interpreted as not requiring the United States to use the canal on the same basis as other nations of the world. There is no question, he said, but that exemption was granted as a bounty to owners of coastwise vessels. He added that he thought it would have been war as a matter of form, to toll the tolls and then refund them.

As a general rule of law, Bonaparte told the committee, when one person grants "to all persons" the right to use his property the grantor is not understood as including himself among those to whom the grant is made. Specific expression of inclusion of the grantor is necessary to bind the grantor to the conditions, he added.

"Applying this principle to the present case," he continued, "if it had been the intention of the parties to this treaty that the United States should use the canal only on the same terms as other powers, then to give effect to that understanding, the United States ought to have promised in so

many words to observe these rules in its own use of the canal."

Russell L. Brown of San Francisco declared that the collection of tolls from American coastwise ships would interfere with the passing of California lumber through the canal. He said that reduction in the price of California petroleum would follow if that product passed through the canal with no tolls. Free tolls, he argued, would develop the horax fields and production of California.

CARRANZA-VILLA MEETING. CHIHUAHUA, April 20.—Generals Carranza and Villa met here formally today. It was their first meeting in four years, Carranza having met the military leader first when fresh from outlawry. He was then the leader of one of Francisco Madero's small revolutionary bands. The meeting had every appearance of friendliness. Nothing was given out about it except that it was harmonious. Villa made a point of referring to Carranza as his chief.
