The events of Institute Week in Bisbee have proved very interesting to the Warren district public and a large number of our people have taken advantage of the opportunity afforded the various sessions. The instructors and lecturers at the Institute have all been very interesting and others besides the teachers have found profit from listening to them. Dr. H. W. Shrock, President of the State Normal University at Carbondale, Illinois, lectured on Monday evening last at the high school auditorium, talking as his subject "The Obligation That Each Individual Owes to Society." Dr. Shrock proved to be a most entertaining and instructive talker, and made himself a great favorite with his audience.

On Tuesday evening the Board of Education and teachers of Bisbee tendered a reception to the visiting teachers. The affair was very cleverly and uniquely arranged, consisting of alternate dances and musical or literary numbers.

The musical and literary numbers consisted of selections by the high school orchestra and high school girls' Glee Club, a song by Miss Marguerite Watson, which was highly appreciated and a couple of most amusing readings by Mr. E. S. Sneider. The music for the dancing was furnished by Brennan's Orchestra.

From the point of view of the public, the most enjoyable event of the week was the dedication of the new high school on Wednesday evening. On this occasion the Warren District had an opportunity to get acquainted with the new president of their state university, Dr. B. B. von Klein Smid, who delivered the address of the evening on the function of the high school as "The People's College."

The unanimous opinion of the audience at the close of Dr. von Klein Smid's address was that Arizona is certainly to be congratulated on the new head of her chief educational institution. Dr. von Klein Smid made an instantaneous "hit" with the people who listened to him last Wednesday evening, proving himself not only a brilliant and forceful speaker but also a winning and engaging personality. He is a wit and humorist of the highest order, and drove home most of his points by that most effective instrument—a hearty laugh. His account of his conversation with the provincial Englishman with his appalling ignorance of America, and of his argument with the self-made man who was setting up as a critic of his daughter's high school education will long remain a pleasurable memory in the minds of his hearers.

The music rendered by the high school orchestra and the high school girls' glee club was also much appreciated, and the presentation of a beautiful flag by the Loyal Orange Lodge of Bisbee was a most effective and impressive ceremony.

On Thursday evening Dr. Mace, Professor of History at Syracuse University, lectured before a most appreciative audience upon the interesting subject "Lincoln and Douglas."

On Thursday evening the high school domestic economy department was the host at a very pleasant little dinner given to the executive committee and the instructors of the institute. Miss Adeline Ulrich, head of the domestic economy department, acted as hostess on this occasion, while Mr. E. Q. Sneider officiated as host.
