# IDENTIFICATION OF UNKNOWN CORPSE

## Ralph Salholm Identified the Body as That of His Father Charles Salholm. Funeral Arrangements Are Made.

After reading for several days of the man who was hit by the train Monday afternoon, Ralph Salholm's curiosity compelled him to visit the morgue. His visit resulted in revealing the identity of the man as that of Charles Salholm, the young man's father. The identity was proven yesterday morning about nine o'clock.

According to Salholm, he read of the accident Tuesday morning and wondered about it. His father was in the habit of going away from home and staying for several days at a time. The family never thought anything of these excursions and the fact that the dead man might be Charles Salholm never entered their minds.

Tuesday evening, upon reading an account of the accident, Salholm decided he would investigate. Instead of doing so Tuesday, however, he

walked until yesterday morning and when he lost his work he came to Bisbee.

The deceased, according to his son, was rather hard of hearing and was prone to "moods." When thinking he would walk along utterly unknowing of anything that might be happening near him. To this condition the son ascribes his untimely death.

Salholm came to Bisbee a number of years ago. He was known as a first class laborer but had been out of work for a number of months. Previous to his arrival in Bisbee he had lived in Colorado. He was a native of Sweden and was sixty-five years old.

The deceased is survived by Mrs. Salholm, the widow, Ralph, Herbert, George and Esther, all of whom live at the home at Cochise street on the east line.

The interment will take place from the home at 4:15 Friday afternoon and will be made in Evergreen cemetery. Rev. Fry will officiate.

## ADMIRALTY CONFIRMS

LONDON, March 10.—The admiralty announced tonight the German submarine sunk by Destroyer Aerial was the U-12 and not the U-29 as previously stated. The U-12 is smaller and an older craft than the U-29.

The U-12 has taken active part in the German campaign against shipping. It is of 250 tons with a cruising radius of 1200 miles. It is armed with three eighteen inch torpedoes and two high angle guns. The speed was 12 knots at the surface.

## FRENCH HERO OF THE MARNE LEADS LAND FORCES NEAR CONSTANTINOPLE



General d'Amade, the French hero of the battle of the Marne, in which the German hosts were turned away from Paris, is in command of the allied army which is now approaching Constantinople in conjunction with the allied fleet. This army contains contingents of Turcos, Senegalese, British Indian troops, Austro-Hungarians and New Zealanders.
