WHEELER WARNS ALL BOOTLEGGERS TO GET OUT OF THE BUSINESS

In Interview Sheriff Declares that Heavy Sentences and Fines, Only, will Stop Practice. Status of Boose Question.

Yesterday noon Sheriff Wheeler, armed with legal papers, took possession of the two trunks of whiskey that have been at the baggage room at the depot for several days. Each trunk contained two cases of Cedar Brook whiskey in pint bottles. There was a case at each end of the trunk, with an empty in between.

Officers have had enough time to capture bootleggers without having them released or given small fines after they are captured," said Sheriff Harry C. Wheeler Sunday. The sheriff came through Bisbee on his way to Douglas, from his headquarters at Tombstone. Continuing, he said, "The only way to stop bootlegging is to impose heavy fines and then enforce them. Practically every fine that has been imposed during the past session of the superior court was remitted."

"It is not surprising to me that both Russell and Rodgers jumped their bonds. Russell never served a day in the jail from the time he was arrested and even after he was found guilty he was allowed by the court to return to Douglas. Quite naturally he fled the country. Whether his bondsmen are responsible is not for me to say. The court held that his bond was a continuing one and was in force even after he was found guilty."

OBJECT STRENUOUSLY TO BENSON PETITION ON SEVERAL GROUNDS

People of Huachuca Siding, Fairbanks and Empire Ranch Property, Register Objection Against Change of Boulevard.

People living along the Borderland route, at Huachuca Siding, on the Empire ranch property, and at Fairbanks, are wrathy. The cause thereof is the petition, gotten up recently and aimed largely in the Warren district, by Benson people to have the Borderland route diverted from its present course to take in the latter named town.

The people who are most object, particularly, to the working of a part of the petition and declare that it is untrue. The Benson petition, according to one of the Huachuca Siding people, declared there were no telephone or telegraph connections along the part of the Borderland they want changed.

The petition also recited there is no gas or oil in the section. The defendants of the matter claim Fairbanks and Huachuca Siding have all of the things which the Benson petition claims they have not.

According to statements of Fairbanks and Huachuca Siding people there is little danger of the Borderland route being changed at this time. They declare that over \$100,000 has been spent upon the route and a fine bridge has been erected over the San Pedro at Fairbanks, the two elements serving to keep the board of control from acting in favor of the Benson petition.

Nothing has been heard of the petition since it was signed, extensively in Bisbee some days ago. It is supposed that the document is now in the hands of the board of control but when action will be had upon it is a matter of conjecture.

According to the City Marshal the force as it now is constituted, consists of H. G. Ruff, E. D. Barton, J. A. Kepperton and C. A. Bailey, Lorenzo Wright and A. E. Shepherd, superintendent of streets and sanitary inspector, by reason of their work, carry commissions under Marshal Allison.

There have been several cases in which men, impersonating an officer, have been sent to the penitentiary for their offenses. In the present case it is a matter of considerable annoyance to the Marshal and to his force, and, according to one of the Marshal's force, would be unofficially greeted with pleasure.
