

ACTIVE MARKET SEES WAR STOCK CLIMB TO HIGH LEVELS AGAIN

New Highs Are Registered By Bethlehem and Other War Specialties; Amalgamated Increases Hands.

NEW YORK, July 15.—In the first four hours war contract stock manifested greater strength while the railways denoted an increased selling pressure. In the final hour conditions underwent a sharp revival of all former speculative favorites coming rapidly to the front with a gain of one to more than two points. The change was coincident with the announcement of the Standard Oil Company that it disposed of its pipe lines to meet the wishes of the interstate commerce commission and the declaration of an increased dividend by Amalgamated which disbursed one dollar instead of the usual half. Record breaking quotations were made in Bethlehem Steel, 13 1/2; American Can, 22 1/4; Phillips Petroleum, 71 3/4 and Willys-Overland, 23 1/2.

ARIZONA AIR BRAKE TESTED IN SHOPS OF RAILROAD, DOUGLAS

Officials and Stockholders of Arizona Air Brake Association See Remarkable Tests Made in Southwestern Shops.

According to L. A. Brown, vice-president, James Henderson, a heavy stockholder and director and Walter Lanford, secretary of the Arizona Automatic Air Association, the demonstration of the Canon brake held yesterday in the car shops of the Southwestern, at Douglas, was a great success.

According to the returning Bisbee men the demonstration not only pleased them but it also met with the approval of the railroad men who supervised the test. Brown, in speaking of the matter last evening, stated that Superintendent Corp and Callahan both declared the brake would handle the heavy ore train, from Bisbee to Douglas, with perfect ease and even better than the present Westinghouse brakes that are used throughout the country.

The difficulty with the Westinghouse, say the experts, is the fact that after the brakes have been released it takes, under the best working conditions, a matter of from thirty seconds to a minute and a half to allow for another application of air to be made. It is advanced, by those who are familiar with the Canon invention that a succession of applications of air can be made by the Arizona brake, without the interim of non-effectiveness that is to be had when Westinghouse apparatus is found. This and other points in the Canon brake were demonstrated yesterday.

It is expected, according to information received from those in a position to know, that the Arizona Corporation, now handling the air brake, may dispose of its interests during the coming fall. Negotiations are now known to be on which would look mighty good to the men and women interested in the brake in Arizona.

FIRST MILL RUN IS SUCCESS AT JUNIPER FLATS; RESULTS GOOD

Completion of Transportation Facilities From Mine to Mill Soon—Retorting of Amalgam Will Be Made in Few Days.

The first mill run of the Juniper Flats Gold Mining Company was made yesterday morning and the results are exceedingly indicative of the most wonderful returns for those behind the big gold enterprise on the hill. Yesterday afternoon, returning visitors from the mill declared the plate, on which the amalgam is deposited, showed such excellent "color" that the retorting of the mass was unnecessary for proof of the presence of gold.

William Truax, yesterday brought into Bisbee a piece of ore from the property which was literally shot with gold. It was found in the bottom of the shaft, after the blast Wednesday evening. The "color" in the specimen was unmistakable and might be called high grade.

Preparations are being rushed for the transportation of the ore from the mine to the mill in Tombstone Canyon. When this is completed, which it is expected to be within the next few days, the company will continue regular mill work and results, in concrete form, may be expected within a few days following this work.

"If the Juniper Flats," said Truax last night, "had been advertised as much as other gold districts, the people who have worked hard out there to make it a go would be well along on the road to progress. If we succeed, and there is every indication that we will and none that we will not, it will be in spite of Bisbee and the people here and not because of them. Definite results to prove that we have not been on a wild goose chase within the next few weeks."


EXPLOSION WRECKS ELEVATOR

When the special committee of the Cochise County Road Board Issues Association meets at 1 o'clock this afternoon, at the office of Secretary Joseph H. Gray, of the Warren District Commercial Club, for the purpose of preparing a report on the general trunk line, County Engineer Ryan will present a map showing mileage very much reduced from that indicated by the requests presented here, last month by the representatives of the various districts.

The system outlined by Engineer Ryan, contains less than 500 miles of roads. It was apparent to all the delegates, at the last meeting, that the demands for 796 miles of highways were excessive and would require an amount for construction which the voters of Cochise County would be unwilling to endorse. It was for the purpose of working out a road system that would meet the most urgent demands and, at the same time, be such as could be built for a sum in reason that this committee was appointed.

So far as is known, all members of the delegate from San Simon, will be present. It is not assured that the county Engineer's system will be adopted without change. It is quite possible that some other roads may be added by the committee. That his system will be cut is unlikely, for the map at his office shows little or nothing that could be eliminated.

The date of the general meeting probably will be left to the Douglas representatives, except that the matter of assuring sufficient time for sending notices to the representatives of the 19 road districts and for their preparations for making the trip to the Smelter City will be suggested. It seems probable, however, that such a meeting will be held early next month.

Following this meeting, the county engineer will go over the different sections with the district representatives and estimate the costs. When this is done, a final meeting of the association can be held, at which will be determined the actual amount which the county will be asked to vote.
