BASE FOR MUNITIONS.
VIENNA, Aug. 4.—The huge bell in the tower of the Cathedral of St. Stefan, popularly known for years as "Die Grosse Brummerin" (The Great Growler), has pealed its last peal. It has been presented to the "War Metal Collection" to be melted up and used in the manufacture of ammunition. The bell has not been sounded for several years because it was thought the tower in which it was hung would not resist the vibrations. It was cast in 1711 out of the metal from captured Turkish cannon, weighs 44 tons, is almost nine feet high and some 32 feet around the base.

PATTIE M. TURNER DIES AT HOSPITAL FOLLOWING ILLNESS

Estimable Employee of Phelps Dodge Mercantile Company Passes Away; Was to Have Been Married in October.

Lying cold in the passageway between the present and past, the smile of a natural and winning self upon the lips, bespeaking of a nature that won friends and kept them, is Pattie M. Turner. The smile of life's plans reached its end, for Mrs. Turner, yesterday afternoon at 4:45.

Bright hopes and brighter future, were blasted when Mrs. Turner died. She was to have been married to George J. Reardon during the month of October. All of the arrangements for the union had been completed and the demise of the bride-to-be has been more than a blow to Mr. Reardon.

The direct cause of death was intestinal obstruction. Mrs. Turner, happy and, apparently, healthy Saturday evening was taken ill at one o'clock Sunday morning. She was removed to the Copper Queen hospital Sunday evening. One year ago she was operated on at the Mayo Brothers' hospital in Rochester, Minnesota, for gastric ulcers. When she arrived at the local hospital and the nature of the malady known, little hope was held for her recovery.

Tuesday evening, after all else had failed and in a final effort to save her life, the doctors decided on an operation. Her condition was such, however, that death followed yesterday afternoon.

The deceased came to Bisbee in the month of January from Albuquerque, New Mexico. She was placed in charge of the women's ready-to-wear department of the Phelps-Dodge Mercantile company. While there her friends, both from her fellow employees and patrons, increased daily until, with her death, a pall has shrouded itself wherever she was known.

Mrs. Turner and George Reardon were school mates in Los Angeles and when she arrived in Bisbee the old ties of friendship rapidly turned into those of love. It has been known to close friends of the couple for some time, that they were to be married in October.

Mrs. Turner leaves several brothers and sisters. Her father is one of the oldest members of the Masonic fraternity in the country, having been a member of that order for sixty-two years. He is living in San Rafael, California, and ill at this time. One sister was communicated with by Mr. Reardon and is expected to arrive in Bisbee Friday morning.

An interesting part of the career of Mrs. Turner was the time she spent with the Diaz government in the City of Mexico. She was an accomplished student of Spanish and was employed for several years in the secret service department of the Diaz government. She returned to the United States some time before the overthrow of the Diaz regime.

Pending the arrival of the sister from California, the body will remain in the Palace Undertaking Parlors, where it will be kept in seclusion until the sister has made disposition of her plans. It is probable that the deceased will be sent to the California home of the father and interred there.


