FIFTY JURORS WILL BE DRAWN FOR FALL TERM OF CO. COURT

Criminal Cases Will, Undoubtedly, Take up the Majority of the Time Between Opening of Session and the Holidays.

TOMBSTONE, Nov. 6. (Special)—An order was made in the Superior Court this morning for the drawing of fifty trial jurors to report for duty on Monday, November 22. It is expected that the jury will be occupied until the holiday period in the trial of criminal cases. There are nearly forty cases now pending on the docket, a many which are seven persons charged with murder.

The Olds case is the first one on the list and has been hanging fire for some time. The prosecution intends to forego the case to trial if possible. Mrs. Olds, every time the case is set for trial, sends in an affidavit to the effect that she is sick and unable to appear in court. Since the last term of court she has been moving around to different parts of Texas and Oklahoma.

The next case is that of Edward Scarborough, charged with the killing of John Clinton near the Mexican line along Hereford. Cal Cox is also under arrest for the same offense. Leonardo Maldonado is charged with the killing of Walter Brooks as is also Pablo Ramirez. The killing took place in Bisbee. Walter Powell is charged with the killing of John Bradford in Globe and Norman Messenger is charged with the killing of John Williamson at Douglas.

These cases, should they all go to trial, will take considerable time. The Olds, Scarborough and Cox cases will each take a week at least and the others will take two or three days each.

The other cases that make up the calendar are for various offenses such as assault with intent to kill, burglary, grand larceny and bootlegging, of the latter there being about twenty cases pending. Some of these are from Douglas and include the Bert Aaron case and those of his companions while others involve parties from Bisbee. Bowie is on the list for one, as are one or two other places in the county, but Douglas heads the list with Bisbee second.

Proceedings in Court.

The case of Miller vs Panzner et al, which was on trial yesterday, was still in court today and was not concluded until a late hour, when judgment was ordered entered for the defendants.

Minnie Munds of Douglas was given a decree of divorce from Frank Munds on the ground of desertion and non support.

Will Move School House.

The school house which was in the Artesia District north of San Simon will be moved to the San Simon District and used as a manual training building by the San Simon school. The Artesia District lapsed sometime ago and the Board of Trustees of the San Simon District asked that they be given the privilege of using the building. They were given that right with the understanding that in case the Artesia District should be renewed they would return the building in good shape.

Return From Trip.

John W. Walker, the Superior Court reporter and his wife returned last evening from an extended trip to the east and to their old home in Indiana. Mr. Walker reports that they had a most enjoyable time. A part of the trip was made in the auto. He will resume his duties as court reporter on Monday.

To Fix Gleason Road.

H. A. Taylor of Gleason has been given permission to do some work on the Gleason Courtland road which is badly in need of repair between the two places. The work will be done by Mr. Taylor under the direction of the county engineer.

SHORT STATE ITEMS FROM VARIOUS PLACES

PRESCOTT—Abelardo Balderamos has filed suit in the superior court here against the Consolidated Arizona Smelting company of Humboldt under the employers liability act. Balderamos, who alleges that he was badly shocked by touching a gate with electricity, asks \$15,000 damages.

RELIGMAN—Over 600 cars of live stock valued at over \$1,000,000 have been shipped from Seligman in the last three months. This showing is said to be the best in Santa Fe territory and puts Seligman in the lead as a shipping point of live stock. Most of the stock shipped went to California and Colorado buyers.

PHOENIX—Members of Commercial bodies throughout the state will attend an organization dinner to be given by the Phoenix Chamber of Commerce during Fair Week for the purpose of forming a state-wide organization. The meeting will be held on Nov. 18.

PHOENIX—With the organization of a new company to take over the alfalfa mill of the Arizona Alfalfa company it has been announced that the mill will begin operation within thirty days. The new company known as the Phoenix Alfalfa Mills, is headed by Frank McCreary.

SCILL VALLEY—Seventy five tons of copper ore are being freighted daily from the Commercial mines in the Copper Basin for shipment from here. It is estimated that there are fully 6,000 tons ahead of the freighting outfit and a branch railroad from Scill Valley is regarded as probable within a year.

GLOBE—The first carload of silver lead ore from the Crescent Consolidated property at Radom will be shipped to El Paso November 12. Active development work has begun and compressors and drills are being installed.

GLOBE—Gila valley vegetable growers are making an active campaign for a place in the local market. Two merchants of Thatcher announced favoring the disposal of an auto truck load of fresh produce here that a regular schedule of selling trips will be inaugurated.

GLOBE—Gila county voters will, on Nov. 15, decide whether the county shall issue bonds in the amount of \$200,000 for road construction. In August the county voted a bond issue of \$700,000 but it was later declared illegal on a technicality. The paving of the Globe-Miami Highway is contemplated in case the bond issue carries.

GLOBE—Ed Knight, proprietor of a drink establishment, has been arrested on a charge of selling intoxicating liquor. Samples of cider sold by Knight were sent to the State Chemist for analysis and are reported to have contained over 5 per cent alcohol.

YUMA—Injunction proceedings have been filed against the board of supervisors by E. G. Caruthers, president of the First National Bank of Yuma, against the letting of a contract to the O. & C. Construction company for paving the Yuma-Somer road with Warrenite. The contract is the largest paving contract ever let in Arizona.

GILA BEND—Ten miles of the new railroad from here to Ajo have been completed and the work of constructing the remaining thirty five miles will be rushed as fast as possible. It is planned to have the railroad completed and in operation by the first of February. The Calumet & Arizona Mining company, which is developing the largest copper property at Ajo, known as the New Cornelia mine, has set aside \$5,000,000 for development work and for the construction of a leaching plant which will be the largest in the world.

PRESCOTT—A high grade of gold ore, running in values as high as \$110.00 in streaks, has been found at the old Home Run mine on Groom Creek. Shipping is to begin at once.

MARMON CAR WINNER OF TUCSON RACE

C. A. Bennett, of Silver City, Owner; Track Slow From Recent Heavy Rains

TUCSON, Nov. 6.—A Marmon car, owned by C. A. Bennett, of Silver City, won first place in the 103-mile race at Southern Arizona Fair Grounds. Time 1:53:24. Prize \$1000. Yelle, T. D. Daley owner, Silver City, won second prize of \$500. Time 1:55:17; and Pope Hartford, Globe, was third in 2:04:03. There were no accidents. Tracks were rather slow on account of recent rains.

MINING INDUSTRY FEATURE OF FAIR

Mineral Wealth of State Will Be Exploited at Phoenix Dur-ing Exposition.

PHOENIX, Nov. 6.—The importance of the mining industry to the state has never been overlooked by the State Fair Commission. Early in the history of the fair a building to itself and apart, was constructed for the better display of the mineral wealth of the state. This is in charge of Hon. James Goodwin, of Maricopa county, who gives a great deal of his time to gathering excellent samples from all the mineral fields of worth in Arizona.

Additional interest is evinced in the mining display that year on account of the samples from the new gold fields of the state being displayed. The Gold and Silver Roads district of Mohave county, and the more recent workings of Yavapai county yielding precious metal to say nothing of the copper in Ajo county, will attract the visitors from Mohave are to the effect that great displays of specimens from all the newly opened mines in the new districts will be shown this year. This will draw more crowds to Phoenix and add to the interest of the mineral exhibit.

BISBEE HIGH TEAM LOSES AT TUCSON

Clever Forward Passes Contribute to Defeat of Inexperienced Bisbee Eleven

TUCSON, Nov. 6.—Although outwitting the local team, the Bisbee High School was overwhelmed this afternoon at Southern Arizona Fair Grounds, twenty-nine to nothing. Lack of experience of Bisbee backs and the clever forward passing of the Tucson men contributed to the Bisbee defeat. The visitors sprung a surprise when they rushed the ball in the first quarter to the Tucson one yard line to lose it in downs. In the second quarter, with the ball on Bisbee one yard line, a brilliant forward pass from Stonaker to Moffett scored the first touchdown. Another touchdown was made by Harris, Tucson center, in the third and in the fourth two touchdowns and a safety by Verhuff, who thought he was making a touch-back, completed the score.

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
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
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
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
