The strength in the war stocks however, does not satisfy the big banking interests. People need to exercise patience. The position of money warrants a full expansion of legitimate business as well as speculation, whatever danger exists lies in technical rather than in fundamental conditions. Speculatively the market is a disappointment. It is a traders market, the public is inclined to hold off and the professional interests are disposed to let prices drift. General conditions are too favorable to suggest any serious decline.

MEXICAN SITUATION BRINGS BILLS AND DEBATES IN CONGRESS

Now that the Mexican situation has again become acute, senators and representatives are busy introducing bills and making speeches dealing with the present crisis. Senators Borah, Thomas, Gallinger and Stone have made speeches advocating armed intervention in case Carranza is unable to handle the situation. In the house Representative Dyer has offered a resolution asking the president if it is not time to invade Mexico. Senator Sherman has introduced a resolution calling for intervention on the part of the United States and other Pan-American nations in case Carranza does not restore order at once.

NEW ZEALAND CENSUS. WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Jan. 19.—The war census recently taken in New Zealand has shown that 109,638 men between the ages of 17 and 44 are "willing" to serve in the Dominion's Expeditionary Force if required. The prime minister, Mr. Massey, says:

"I had confidence that when the position was put to them they would do the right thing. I am satisfied now that they will come forward when wanted and so far as I am able to judge a very large proportion of those willing will be required."

Notwithstanding the war census figures and Mr. Massey's statement there is from many quarters in the Dominion a strong demand for conscription. One county council has resolved not to employ single men who are eligible to go to the front and several influential newspapers in New Zealand are urging their own particular local bodies to take similar action.

The marriage rate has lately assumed abnormal dimensions, from which it is announced that many men are entering wedlock because employers have announced that in order to leave young men free to enlist they intend to give preference to married men.

BOTTLE DEFICIT IN FRANCE—EXPLAINED Lack of Men As Well As Inroads of Enemy Ascribed as Cause; Importation of the Workmen Only Partial Aid. PARIS, Jan. 19.—The bottle deficit of France to date is about 235 million resulting from the occupation of territory comprising some of the important glass works of the departments of the North and the department of the Marne. The wine and other French industries require about 325 million of which between ten and fifteen million are exported. The glass works now in operation produce only about 90 million bottles a year. The consequence is, mineral water bottles that were purchased before the war at one cent each now bring a little over two cents. Lamp chimneys have trebled in price as well as sashets and window glass. Wine bottles containing about a quart have gone up from \$4 to \$7 per hundred, while in the Saumur district bottles intended for naturally sparkling wine brought \$9 per hundred. "The reason for the bottle crisis," says Monsieur Sauvageot, general secretary of the glass makers association, "is not entirely the occupation of part of our glass producing territory by the enemy. Our industries in departments that were not invaded are also seriously affected by the inroads made upon their workmen by the mobilization. It is very difficult to replace these men and the mobilization of one skilled glass blower puts a furnace out of business. "American workmen and labor from Brazil and Spain were imported by bottle makers in the Cognac district, while Arabs and Kabyles were brought from Algeria by glass makers in the department of the Allier. These measures increased largely the wage scale without entirely remedying the difficulty. Women have helped out some in certain districts, and in time the glass makers would be able to bring their production up to the normal were it not for the further complications of a deficit of material. Glass sand has doubled in price, as well as lead, while potash is almost impossible to find. Before the war we bought it at \$10 per hundredweight, today we pay \$90 when we can find it. Add to this the doubling of the cost of our coal and you have the elements that explain the troubles of the glass industry." This glass crisis would have been all the more serious had not the consumption of wine, brandy and mineral water bottles declined 50 per cent. The measures taken against the sale of alcohol have also resulted in a dimin-
