

PHOENIX PERPLEXED OVER SELECTION OF CITY CANDIDATES

Quiet Grooming is Going On in Various Camps for Mayor and Commissioners but Names are Held Back.

PHOENIX, Jan. 20.—About as much mystery surrounds the city "political" situation as ever attended the fate of Charlie Ross or the whereabouts of Villa. That there will be candidates galore for the offices of mayor and commissioners, there is no doubt but the probable candidates are keeping well under cover, though there is no end of quiet grooming going on in various camps.

There is no reason to believe that George U. Young will not be a candidate for re-election to the office of mayor. He has neither denied nor affirmed the report of his candidacy. Even should he declare himself not a candidate his friends intend to file a petition and to work for him before the primaries.

Other names mentioned as probable candidates for the office of mayor are Frank Woods, former city commissioner, who has had one year out of

office and who refuses to discuss the matter of another campaign. J. C. Adams was mentioned yesterday as was Harry Kay. Then W. C. Foster was referred to as one whose friends will see to it that his name goes before the primaries. There are half a dozen who have been mentioned or suggested but as far as can be learned most of these are merely "rumors".

For the commission, upon which will be two vacancies, the retiring incumbents, Joseph Cope and Peter Corpestante, are likely to be candidates for re-election. It is whispered that M. J. Foley, who retired from the commission with Frank Woods one year ago, will permit his petition to be circulated. Claud W. Cisney, former city councilman, and Charles J. McElroy, also a former city councilman, are spoken of as aspiring to places on the commission. Corporation Commissioner F. A. Jones has not made widespread denial of the report that he will be a candidate for the commission. There was a rumor yesterday that Commissioner O. T. Riehey might resign as commissioner and go into the race for the office of mayor.

Not a few citizens are expressing themselves as desirous that Col. E. W. Coggins become a candidate for mayor, and the friends of Former Mayor Lloyd B. Christy say the city needs him back in office.

The only definite report that could be secured was that Dr. Lightburne will continue as commissioner from the fifth ward.

the project, the great lake has worked out its destiny.

Yesterday morning at 6 o'clock the elevation of the reservoir was given out as 221.45 feet. The 3.55 feet which it lacked of going over came into the reservoir in ten hours and ten minutes. The number of acre feet which came were 59,410, making a total contents for the reservoir of 1,367,300 acre feet. In the afternoon the intake behind

the dam registered eleven feet. This is a record for this year. The water was coming along so fast all over the entire project that to measure it in millions of inches was almost out of the question. Second feet were resorted to as a measuring medium. The Verde river furnished the major portion of the excess water. At 4 o'clock the officials of the reclamation service stated that 40,000 second feet of water were raging along within its banks.

Since that time, Fossil creek, at which point the measurements of the Verde are taken, has raised and, according to reports, is still on the upward trend.

All water was let out of the Arizona canal, to give the immense volume coming down Cave creek an outlet. Superintendent of Maintenance A. J. Halton was out yesterday with a gang of men and teams looking after the levee at Horseshoe dam site. There was some danger that the levee might give way, but late last evening Mr. Halton said that he was confident that it would hold out. He had established a camp on the dam site and left his men there, prepared for eventualities.

Project Manager Cone gave out notice yesterday that the bridge at Fish Creek was on the verge of collapsing and that all heavy motor cars would be in danger of going through it if they attempted to cross it. No communication by auto stage with Globe has been held for a day or so.

Practically the same condition existed at Tempe yesterday as in Phoenix. A wild rumor was circulated that the bridge had been washed out, but it was far from the truth. The levee at Tempe, which protects the town from the river who is not in the best of shape, in case it should burst the south side town might stand some chance of being soaked a bit.

TELEGRAPH ISOLATED

Since 9:05 Wednesday evening there has not been a single message over the wires of the Western Union Telegraph company. Passengers on the train which arrived in Bisbee yesterday afternoon from the east stated that the line is badly damaged east of Douglas.

From Douglas west, through the snowbound district, the line is in terrible shape, most of the poles being down. Between Bisbee and Osborn Junction, about six miles of poles and wire are on the ground.

Gangs of men are working east from El Paso, east from Douglas and south from Tucson to repair the damage. It is not thought probable, however, that any communication can be established before late today and possibly not before Saturday.

B. I. Company's Trouble.

Breaking wires and burned out transformers caused most of the damage to the lines of the Bisbee Improvement company, according to manager C. S. Thompson. The loss to the company is estimated at \$1,000.

Though every effort was made to get the service back to normal and a large force employed to accomplish the work there was a considerable portion of the District in darkness last evening. Manager Thompson stated that normal would again hold by tonight. No trouble was had with the gas department of the company.

Mails Move Slowly.

The mail from the east, due at 9:40 a. m., arrived at 2 p. m. The train from the west, due shortly before 5 o'clock yesterday morning, arrived at 2 in the afternoon. No mails have been received from points west of Yuma, during the past three days. Train, due at 6:55, last night, from Tucson, was on time. Wednesday evening's 10:15 train from the east was on time. Outgoing mails, of course have been similarly effected. It is expected that several days will elapse before the mail service, to and from the Warren District can be resumed on its usual schedule.

Sustains Broken Leg.

Joseph White, a miner from Kingman, sustained a broken leg in a fall on the tracks in front of the Mason House in Lowell, where he had been stopping. He has taken to the C & A hospital the accident occurred at 1:30 yesterday afternoon.

Doyle Roof Falls.

Last night between ten and eleven o'clock the occupants of the Doyle Rooming House, in Tombstone Canyon, were forced to retreat to the street owing to a collapse of a part of the room, due to the burden of snow. No one was hurt in the accident. Yesterday morning the San Jose house and the Williams House, both on Brewery Gulch, also collapsed.

More Snow Had.

At different times during the night snow again fell. There was little inclination, however, that it would continue as the weather had turned considerably colder.

ROOSEVELT DAM HAS RECORD SUPPLY AND WATER OVERFLOWS

Six Feet of Torrent at Spillways and Reclamation Service Warns Ranchers of the Danger of Floods.

PHOENIX, Jan. 20.—At midnight, the reclamation service gave out notice that over twice as much water was to be expected in the Salt River today. At that time there was 3.12 feet of water coming over the spillways. It is expected that there will be five or six feet going over by 6 o'clock this morning. The Verde river is still coming up, and conditions up around Prescott are getting worse. The peak of the water is expected some time this afternoon. Officials of the reclamation service warn ranchers in the lower valley to be on the lookout for the on-coming flood.

Never faltering for an instant, the lake behind the dam at Roosevelt fulfilled expectations and predictions and at ten minutes after four yesterday afternoon the first drops came out on the spillway, and after hesitating for an instant, decided to go over. Thus for the second time in the history of
