NEW YORK, March 28.—External affairs, as represented by the threatened crisis with the Teutonic powers, appeared to exert very slight influence so far, at least, as they bore upon the more speculative aspects of the market.

Trading was fairly active during the forenoon, tapered off materially at mid-day and became increasingly apathetic in the final hour.

Such favorites as Crucible Steel, American Locomotive, the motors, and semi-drawings and equipments, rose to four points but metals and oils were relatively backward, except for Butte and Superior and American Zinc.

Coppers were variable, the failure of the Anaconda directors to increase the dividend acting as a restraint. Sugars were again distinguished for their meteoric flights, with new high records for Cuban American, which rose 16 points to 245, and South Porto Rico on its gain of 7 to 197.

Rails and other investment stocks were negligible features but fairly firm. Bethlehem Steel ended another 25 points to its steady reversal of recent days, falling to 470 and Mercantile Marine was consistently heavy, in marked contrast to the strength of United Fruit, United States Steel fluctuated within fractional limits and was eclipsed in activity by a half dozen stocks of lesser prominence.

Quotations were a point or more under their best at the close. Total sales of stocks amounted to 569,000 shares. More orders for rails and other equipment were placed.

Dealings in bonds were without special feature, aside from advances in St. Louis and San Francisco issues. Total sales of bonds par value were \$2,560,000.

U. S. bonds were unchanged on call.

JEROME-VERDE GETS

READY TO DEVELOP

ITS PROPERTIES

Work Will be Undertaken with Guidance of Verde Extension Interests Which Own Block of Stock.

JEROME, March 27.—James S. Douglas and Major A. J. Pickrell have spent the past two or three days in Jerome on one of their regular inspection trips at the Little Daisy. The only new feature connected with Little Daisy development work is that of contemplated work to be commenced soon on a portion of the property of the Jerome Verde by the U. V. Extension Company. This work will be done directly under the direction of H. P. Henderson, consulting engineer for the Jerome Verde people and E. O. Holter of New York, who has lately acquired an option on considerable of the Jerome Verde stock.

The U. V. Extension people stated the only way their company is at all interested in the adjacent mine is through an option on a small block of stock which they now hold.

The proposed work is mutually helpful to both companies, and the adjoining properties will be worked in a manner wholly harmonious with the development plans for both pieces of property; the arrangements agreed upon afford the Little Daisy the convenience of air passages, etc., for their underground work as now outlined.

Among the visitors at the Little Daisy this week who are interested in the property are George E. Tener, vice-president of the U. V. Extension and Miss Tener; Henry R. Rea and John C. Oliver, all of Pittsburg, Pa. All are heavy stockholders in the company.

H. P. Henderson, the consulting engineer mentioned above, expects to remain in Jerome to give his personal attention to the work on the Jerome Verde to be undertaken in the immediate future.

CRIMINAL CALENDAR IS ABOUT COMPLETED FOR SPRING SESSION

Majority of the Bootlegging Cases That Did Not Reach Trial Will Be Handled by Next Jury Panel.

TOMBSTONE, March 28. (Special)—The work of clearing up the criminal calendar was completed today. The majority of the bootlegging cases were continued for a further setting while in one or two instances in which the evidence would not warrant the State going to trial, the cases were dismissed. John Julian who was held to answer on a charge of an assault with a deadly weapon alleged to have been committed in Douglas, entered a plea of guilty to simple assault and was sentenced to serve a term of three months in the county jail.

Miguel Ramirez, who was convicted of burglary on Saturday by the jury was sentenced to serve a term of not less than three nor more than five years in the state penitentiary.

Francisco Rodriguez who was convicted yesterday of selling intoxicating liquors by the jury who were out less than five minutes, was sentenced to serve a term of ninety days in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$100. His attorney, Frank Doan, gave notice of appeal and he will be released on a \$1000 bond pending that appeal, but is being held in the county jail until the bond is furnished.

James Murray, who was convicted with Andy Johnson of the crime of introducing liquor, was released on a \$1000 bond, pending the appeal. He, with Andy Johnson, will be sentenced in the morning and the motion for a new trial and the question of appeal taken up.

Jim Cardone who was arrested near Bowie with intoxicating liquor in his possession which he had brought across the line entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to serve a term of 90 days and the payment of \$25. He paid his fine and as he has already served ten days, he was allowed to depart to his home at Miami.

Petancio Saldiva also caught at Bowie for the same offense, was sentenced to serve a term of 100 days at hard labor.

Habeas Corpus Writ John Fry of the Hunchucos, who was brought in last week on a commitment ordering him held on a charge of making threats to kill, issued by Judge Magne at Garces, has through his attorney, J. T. Kinsbury, sought a writ of habeas corpus. The matter will be heard before the court on Thursday. Fry is accused of making threats against the life of one James Wiechsham over disputes arising on mining property in Miller canyon. He claims in his petition that at the hearing he was not allowed to introduce any testimony but was committed at once by the Justice. All particulars will be brought into court and the matter thrashed out.

All After Pardons or Paroles. County Attorney Ross nearly every day receives a letter from the Board of Pardons and paroles asking about different parties that have been sent up from Cochise County, who wish to be paroled or pardoned by the Board. During the past few days he has received three. One of them asked for a pardon for a Mexican, Jose Silvas, who killed another Mexican in 1907 and was sentenced to life. He has been out on parole since last December and now wants a pardon. The murder was one of the worst in the history of Cochise county. Another one if from R. L. Nutt who was sent up from here last March for the crime of forgery and was sentenced to serve a term of not less than seven nor more than fourteen years. Nutt was up before the court before he was sentenced and released on parole or a suspended sentence and within two weeks went out and committed the same act again, that was why he was given such a stiff sentence by the court. Now he

is asking for a parole. Another one is for Leandro Rodriguez, who was sent up for grand larceny. He was released on parole and after being out but a few months broke his parole and was sent back and held a few months and then again released and he now wants a pardon. Mr. Ross has as yet taken no action in these cases but did recommend in another case that of H. H. Stoddard, a pardon, as Stoddard had been out for several years on a parole.

Released on Writ. Sestanos Marquez, who was arrested at Dragoon charged with stealing one of high grade from the Promissio Chemical Company was released from custody this afternoon on a writ of habeas corpus. The writ was granted on the ground that the commitment to the sheriff on which he was held did not state a public offense. The commitment charged him with stealing ore and not with larceny as it should have done. He was held by Justice Clemons at Dragoon and had been in jail for several days.

STEERS' RECORD PRICE DENVER, March 28.—What is said to be the highest price paid for steers on the local market was recorded in the stockyards today when 25 steers brought \$9.15 per hundred pounds the animals averaged 1430 pounds.
