SMALL POX PATIENT CAUSES EXCITEMENT WITH WELLS-FARGO
Man Who Was Shipped From Douglas, Supposedly With Prickly Heat, Causes Many Cars To Be Fumigated

Wells-Fargo Express Company's equipment and its men enjoyed the distinction of much fumigation Sunday afternoon when it was discovered that a patient brought to the Warren District, presumably, suffering with some form of prickly heat, was pronounced a small pox case.

As a result the express car, attached to the train which goes through to Tucson from El Paso, was fumigated; the car which makes the connection at Osborn, was handled likewise; the Bisbee office of the corporation was fumigated. On top of all this the employees of the company, who handled the man from the station at Douglas to Bisbee, hastened to the doctors and were vaccinated.

The patient, after his arrival in Bisbee, was started for one of the local hospitals. One of the Doctors, however, took the case and, instead of going to the hospital, the man was taken to the pest house at Edn Luis.




