

WORKMEN CLEARING O. K. BLOCK SITE FOR DIAMOS THEATRE

Old Bisbee Landmark Being Torn Down To Be Supplanted By Theatre Building. Has Interesting History

One of the twenty year old landmarks of the Warren District is to be demolished. The O. K. block, purchased some months ago by the Diamos Brothers for the purpose of erecting a theatre on the site, is now being torn down, the working starting yesterday.

Some months ago it became known that the Diamos Brothers, who operate motion picture shows in Nogales, Douglas, Tucson and Bisbee, were negotiating with the owner of the block, Robert Hennessy, for its purchase. After a few days the deal was consummated.

It is understood that the lot is expected to be cleared in about ten days. That side, fronting on Review Alley, is already down and the second story of the front is being torn down at a rapid rate. The lot in front is fifty feet wide. It extends from the Miners' store limit to the Justice of the Peace office. The lot, in shape, is more mindful of an arrow-head than anything else. The point of the arrow-head is that part extending north from Naco road and the head of the arrow-head is the block's frontage.

Immediately following the completion of the tearing down process the owners will go to work on the new theatre building which will cost in the neighborhood of \$25,000. The structure will be erected of brick and concrete. Four months is expected to see the edifice completed.

The O. K. block has an interesting history. It was built approximately twenty years ago by J. H. McKim, who with a partner has made some money in northern Mexico in the mining business. McKim owned the building until two years ago when Robert Hennessy, who had been the tenant for many years, purchased the property. The original owner is now retired and lives in Riverside, California.

The plans of the other owners of property adjoining the site are unknown. It is understood, however, that Hennessy may sell the remaining part of the block which he still owns. This includes that part housing the offices of Judge Totman, M. C. High and the Dept. Smoke House, besides the upstairs.

"LID" IN BISBEE TO BE CLAMPED DOWN BY THE CITY COUNCILMEN

Twelve O'clock Closing Law Proposed And Licenses May Be Revoked To Do Business

That the city council of Bisbee will take immediate and earnest steps to eliminate what was painted as a deplorable condition in the community with reference to the illegal traffic in liquor became apparent when the aldermen instructed City Attorney L. B. Whitney to draft an ordinance closing all soft drink shops and other similar establishments from 12 o'clock midnight until 6 o'clock in the morning. The council also went on record as favoring the revoking of city liquor licenses to those in the city who were suspected of selling liquor.

The first business of last evening's session of the council which was productive of more work in the same length of time, than of any session in the past two years, was the introduction by Councilman Wm. Delbridge of an ordinance to regulate soft drink establishments and provide for other changes in the administration of the city's traffic in liquor.

The first section of the proposed ordinance provided for open fronts of all pool and billiard halls, soft drink parlors and stores, rooms where card games of any kind are conducted and like places of public resort. Section Two made it unlawful to keep or have or permit to be kept, had or possessed in any of the places provided for in the first section of the ordinance, or in any restaurant, or in any cellar, closet (room or space) any intoxicating liquor whatever. The section also provided that the finding of such liquors would be prima facie evidence that the proprietor and person in charge permitted such liquors to be kept on the premises.

The next section provided for the closing of all such resorts between unspecified hours. The last section, excepting that enumerating the punishment in case of violation of the ordinance, provided that no drunks should be tolerated in any of the places described in the first section and provided, also, for the punishment of such drunks.

City Attorney Whitney, after the proposed ordinance was read, read an opinion on its legality. He disapproved of every section of the proposed ordinance with the exception of the section having to do with the regulation of the hours of such places of business. The opinion was in writing and went into lengthy detail and argument in each instance.

As a consequence of the opinion it was moved in the council that the city attorney draft an ordinance regulating the hours of pool rooms, soft

drink parlors and other, similar places. In all probability the hours of closing will be from 12 o'clock midnight to 6 o'clock in the morning. City Marshal Allison also was instructed that the licenses of many local establishments, now suspected of selling liquor, would be revoked if it could be proved that any disorder was usual in the places.

Upon request of Dr. R. E. Herndon, city physician, the city attorney was also instructed to draw up an ordinance providing for the establishment of the office of city bacteriologist and making provisions for his salary, etc. This ordinance is now being asked in Douglas and a resolution similar in character, is also to be passed by the supervisors. It will put on record in Douglas, Bisbee and on the records of the board of supervisors the actions of those three bodies in equipping and maintaining a bacteriological laboratory.

It was announced by the council last evening that it would meet on the first Monday in July to act as a board of equalization and that budget matters would be considered about the same time. Following the elimination and completion of a mass of detailed city business the council adjourned.

PERSONAL USE BANQUET.


REMINDS DE FACTOS TO FIND BANDITS

Brownsville Commander Urges General Ricaut To Show Speed

(By Review Leased Wire.) BROWNSVILLE, Tex., June 20.—Although no additional bandit raids in the Brownsville section were reported to Fort Brown headquarters tonight, General James Parker, commanding the Brownsville district of the border patrol officially reminded General Alfredo Ricaut, Matamoros commander, of his promise to round up the bandits who crossed the river into the United States last Friday night and attacked a detachment of American soldiers. At the same time General Parker gave General Ricaut the names of several bandits known to have been in the San Benito raid. It was reported here tonight, on apparently reliable authority that Aniceto Pizana, bandit leader, had been made a colonel in the defacto government army and had been given a command, which had been detailed to defend the plaza at Matamoros in case of attack. General Parker today also sent word to Consul J. Z. Garza at Matamoros to return to his post at Brownsville, guaranteeing Garza full protection. Consul Garza left here for Matamoros Sunday. It was reported that Garza had joined the defacto troops with the rank of captain.

The body of Wm. Browne, an American, who is believed to have been murdered Saturday night at Matamoros, Mex., was buried today on the Mexican side of the Rio Grande ten miles from Matamoros.

Albert Browne, mayor of Brownsville, and brother of the dead man, was refused permission by General Ricaut the Carranza commander, to disinter the body and bring it to the American side. General Ricaut said the request should have been made to Mexico City. The body was found early today floating in the Rio Grande ten miles south of the Mexican town. Browne was last reported alive in Matamoros Saturday afternoon.
