TWO DREADNOUGHTS FOR SENATE NAVY BILL.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—A building program of at least four battle cruisers and two dreadnoughts and an increase of 20,700 men in the navy enlisted personnel, were agreed on at a White House conference today as provisions which the administration will ask the Senate to include in the pending naval bill. As passed by the house, the measure provides for only five capital ships, all battle cruisers and for a personnel increase of only 13,000 men.

Secretary Daniels, Chairman Tillman of the Senate naval committee, and Senator Swanson, another majority committee member, went over the building and personnel questions carefully with President Wilson and it was said afterward that work will be started immediately to write into the bill the increases agreed upon.
