SAN DIEGO EXPOSITION TRACK MEET WILL BE THE GREATEST EVER IN WEST

Such athletes as Fred Kelly, low huddle champion of the world and Howard Drew, holder of the national 100 and 200 yard records will be seen in action at San Diego's big stadium, seating 45,000, at the Western Track and Field Championships, August 17, 18 and 19.

Practically every athletic club, college and university on the Pacific coast will be represented in the Far Western field and track championships, to be held in the stadium, August 17, 18 and 19, in conjunction with the national boxing championships. The big three-day meet will mark the appearance of the greatest assemblage of noted athletes ever seen in California. Among the entries are world's champions, several national champions and many coast champions.

The boxing championships will be held in the War of the Worlds coliseum on the Exposition Isthmus on the nights of August 17, 18 and 19. The San Francisco Olympic Club and the Los Angeles Athletic Club have entered their best boxers in each class, and the Northwest, which is particularly strong in the number of champions it possesses will be represented by the best men from the Multnomah Athletic Club, the Seattle Athletic Club and from Spokane.

80 BANDITS CROSS INTO CHIHUAHUA TO JOIN PANGHO VILLA

Seven Hundred De Factos Leave Juarez to Take Up Pursuit. Carranzista Reported Absconding.

EL PASO, Texas, Aug. 5.—Mariano Tames, formerly a colonel of the Villa army leading about 100 men is making his way south and west from the border today in an attempt to join Villa by the Mapimi district according to reports here. Tames, who started from Juarez early today with six men from the garrison after failing to organize

a revolt in the garrison was joined by eighty men on the outskirts of the town and by a score more from the garrison at Samalayuca, thirty miles south, the reports said. Pursuing him is a column of 700 despatched by General Francisco Gonzales, commanding the Cranza army of northern Chihuahua, with orders to bring back the bodies of the revolutionists.

In some quarters here there was a tendency to connect the Tames uprising with the reported revolt of General Luis Medina Barron, former federal leader and defender of Torreon against Villista attacks and the 200 men of his command in the state of Guerrero on the Mexican west coast, in military circles, however, it was believed that the two revolts are entirely separate.
