DARK HORSES WIN SHARE OF BIG EVENTS

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 22.—While two favorites were winners today in the grand circuit races at North Randall, surprises were plenty, outsiders and "dark horses" getting their share of the glory.

In addition to some exceptionally fast racing and some hard fought battles, the crowd of 8,000 was thrilled when Lee Axworthy trotted an exhibition mile in 2:00 1/4, breaking the world's record for a stallion by three-quarters of a second. The record 2:01 was held by The Harvester.

Charley Valentine and Sister Strong gave the talent a bumping in the 2:18 trot, Sister Strong winning the first two heats and the race in handy fashion, although the third heat was taken by Breach, the favorite.

Dimeter, the favorite in the 2:12 pace, had little trouble in winning two opening miles and the race, but in the third heat Tommy Murphy, with The Problem, shot across in the lead and got second in the summary.

In the Glennville three-year-old trot, Fidds Creek, a Kentucky horse and the favorite, made the rifle in two heats, Maple Tree giving the Creek some hot competition right up to the wire.

The 2:05 pace was fiercely contested from start to finish, it requiring four heats to determine the winner. Fay Richmond gaining that honor by reason of his grabbing off the second and fourth heats and getting within the money in the third. Judge Ormonde, the favorite, won the opening mile, but after that was unable to get in front.

GENERAL MURRAY SAVES SUEZ CANAL



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MANDAMUS AGAINST RECORDER DENIED BY COURT; FULL TEXT

Entire Decision of Judge Lockwood, Denying the Mandamus Petition in Behalf of Lowell Man, Handed Down

TOMBSTONE, Aug. 22.—(Special)—The following is the full opinion rendered by Judge Lockwood in the Chapman writ of mandamus case against County Recorder Murphy, to compel him to change his registration:

"This is an action wherein plaintiff seeks a writ of mandamus against the county recorder to compel him to cancel the entry of plaintiff's registration heretofore made. The complaint alleges that plaintiff heretofore registered in pursuance of law, and that among other matters required by law to be stated by the recorder upon registration, he at that time claimed his political affiliation to be 'no party'."

"It further alleges that since said registration he has become affiliated with the Democratic party, and has, in writing, requested of the county recorder, the cancellation of his previous registration for the reason of his change of party affiliation as aforesaid, and that the county recorder has refused to make such cancellation. Plaintiff claims that great injury will be done him if he is not allowed to have his registration heretofore made cancelled, and a new entry made showing his new party affiliation. He does not state exactly wherein the injury lies, but it may be presumed from a reading of the entire complaint that the injury is that he will not be allowed to participate in the primary of the Democratic party. He therefore brings this action under Paragraph 2899 of the Civil Code, 1915, to compel such cancellation. To this complaint the defendant,

Owen E. Murphy, as county recorder aforesaid, has filed a demurrer, which raises the true issue in this case, to wit: as the reason given—a change of party affiliation after registration—a sufficient one to allow the recorder to cancel his registration heretofore made, and presumably, re-register with a different party affiliation.

Under the constitution of our state, Article VII, Sec. 12, the Legislature is directed to pass registration laws for the purpose of securing the purity of elections and guarding against abuses of the elective franchise. By Article VII, Sec. 10 of that same organic law, we have formally recognized the party system or nominations, and have, through various acts of the Legislature, placed primary elections on practically the same footing as the general elections. Whether this be wise or not may be disputed; that it is a fact cannot be denied.

The Constitution itself provides the qualification for voters at the general election, but left to the Legislature the requirements for participating in the party primaries. That body, in its wisdom, after experimenting with various methods for testing party fealty, has finally provided that the elector at the time he registers, must state his party affiliation, and that he shall participate in the primary of
