

**MRS. THOMAS BLAIR
DIES IN CALIFORNIA**

Bisbee Woman Succumbs to Short Illness—Her Death Felt by Many Friends.

After a short illness Mrs. Lottie P. Blair, wife of Thomas Blair and one of the best known women of the Warren District, died Wednesday night at Redondo Beach, California, where, with her mother, Mrs. David Mathews, and sister, Mrs. F. A. Nathan, she had gone for her health several months ago. A little daughter was born Monday night and the mother never recovered.

Mrs. Blair was born in California and, with her mother and sister, came to Bisbee many years ago. The deceased was married to Thomas Blair six years ago. The husband is the agent for the New York Life insurance company in this section.

F. A. Nathan and Mrs. Mathews left for Redondo Beach Wednesday evening and arrived yesterday after the death of Mrs. Blair. Last evening Mrs. R. E. Warner, Mrs. C. W. Hicks and Mrs. Wolf, all close friends of the family, left for the coast city to attend the funeral. The interment will be made in Redondo Beach this afternoon at 5 o'clock.

According to Miss M. Hoben, of the Phelps Dodge ready-to-wear department, who has just returned from New York on a buying tour, the large sailor or blouses and the distinct design for pockets on skirts are the most marked features of the styles to be seen on the Great Broadway.

While discussing the styles to be seen in New York she made the following remarks:

"The type of suit which is likely to be the most popular for the coming fall and winter, is the long jacket suit of various lengths, from 36 inches to 45 inches. Furs are used almost exclusively for trimming, harmonizing the color of furs with the fabric. The materials are broadcloth, serge and wool velours.

"The one-piece dress of serge or satin developed in combination with Georgette crepe is much used for street wear at present in New York City. The Georgette blouse is to be worn again this fall. They are to have a little more stability by way of chiffon linings. In many instances they show embroideries of beads and gold and silver threads.

"If any particular feature is to be mentioned as the most important from fashion's viewpoint, it is the collar, which is most extreme in style. The

large sailor collar, extending almost to the waist line, is seen on the blouse. The sible collar which later laps one end through the other, at one side of the front, is the popular motor coat feature.

"The ornamental pockets appear again on skirts and are of such original and unusual form that they seem a part of the trimming scheme."



Republican Convention Selects Bursum and Hubbell to Head Campaign.

SANTA FE, N. M., Aug. 24.—The New Mexico state Republican convention concluded its nominations late today and proceeded to the selection of a central committee to-night following which district conventions were held by the delegates present. The full ticket nominated is as follows:

For governor, H. O. Bursum; for U. S. Senator, Frank A. Hubbell; for congressman, B. C. Hernandez, renominated; for justice of the supreme court, Clarence J. Roberts; for lieutenant governor, W. E. Lindsey, of Portales, for secretary of state, Gilberto Mirabal, of Valencia County; for state treasurer, Gregory Page of Gallup; for state auditor, W. G. Sargent, renominated; for land commissioner, R. P. Ervin, renominated; for corporation commissioner, Malaquias Martinez of Taos; for attorney general, Frank W. Clancy, renominated; for state schools superintendent, J. H. Wager of Santa Fe; for presidential electors, Dr. C. L. Hill of Las Cruces, H. J. Hammond of Clayton, and Juan Ortiz of Santa Fe County. W. E. Lindsey of Roosevelt County is a former Progressive.

**SALT LAKE HEARS
AND SEES HUGHES**

"I propose that we shall have in the administration of the Philippines the highest standard of efficiency and fair dealing.

"Fundamentally, the question is one of national honor. We took the Philippines under a sacred obligation. It is our duty to discharge that obligation and I propose that we hold the flag of the United States before the world as the flag which never betrays a trust."

Of preparedness Mr. Hughes said: "We are not militaristic. Why you couldn't get up a militaristic spirit in this country of you sent out a team of organizers to do it. We propose, however, to be ready for any emergency and have our words taken at their full value."

The nominee repeated his assertion that the regular army should be large and efficient enough to do border duty such as now is being done by the national guard and the navy adequate to protect both coasts. The nominee repeated his condemnation of "pork barrel" legislation.

"The other day I pointed the finger of scorn at the pork barrel bills passed under this administration," he said, "and immediately there was a flutter of hit birds in the halls of Congress."

Mr. Hughes left at midnight for Cheyenne, Wyo., where he will speak tomorrow night.

Mr. Hughes spoke from the pulpit

of the Mormon Tabernacle, directly in front of the great pipe organ, famed as one of the largest in the world. Where usually sit the apostles of the Church just below the pulpit there sat tonight invited guests of local prominence regardless of political faith. These seats were smothered with bunting and the great elliptical balcony also was hidden by national flags.

Republicans who arranged the meeting had sent invitations to a number of leading Democrats. Simon Bamberger, Democratic candidate for governor, sat on the platform, next to Francis A. Lyman, president of

the Apostles of the Mormon Church. Nearby sat Anthony H. Lund, first counsellor of the presidency of the church.

W. H. King, Democratic candidate for United States senator, Mathonhab Thomas, Democratic state chairman, and other Democratic leaders were present.

The big tabernacle was crowded and the men at the doors were turning the late ones away, when the strains of the great organ announced that Mr. Hughes had reached the meeting.

Governor Spry of Utah, was chairman of the meeting.
