NEW PHYSICAL DIRECTOR.

Corporal H. A. McGlochan, of the Connecticut signal corps, stationed at Nogales, is now endeavoring to get his release from the service in order to come to Bisbee to become physical director at the Bisbee Y. M. C. A. He has already made application, which

was given the O. K. of his commanding officer, for his release and will know in a short time whether he will be able to come or not. A. B. Richardson, of the "Y", made a trip to Nogales two weeks ago, to see Corporal McGlochan and stated that he found him to be just the man needed here; good personality and ample experience in the work. He has had eight years' experience, and has held the position of assistant physical director in the New York City Y. M. C. A., the same position in the Toronto, Canada, Y. M. C. A. and was physical director at the Middleton, Connecticut, "Y". He is a man six foot tall, weighs 180 pounds and is 26 years old. SAVINGS INCREASE.

That the postal savings department of the Bisbee post office is growing more and more popular is shown by the government report of cities which showed extraordinary increases for July, 1916, over July, 1915. Bisbee shows an increase for July of this year over July of last year of \$23,749 and stands twenty-first, just following St. Louis of the cities in the United States showing an increase. The report states that on July 31 7,687 post offices accepting deposits in the United States, Alaska, Porto Rico and Hawaii. The number of depositors were 612,000 with \$89,700,000 standing to their credit.
