


Brooklyn at Last Expects to Win a National League Pennant.



SCHOOLS OF THE WARREN DISTRICT OPEN MONDAY; LARGEST ENROLLMENT IN HISTORY OF THE INSTITUTION EXPECTED THIS YEAR

Warren School Building Has been Completed and Will Relieve Some Congestion in That End of the District—Other Improvements are Noted—Enrollment is Expected to Approximate 2000, Two Hundred More Than Last Year.

Expecting the largest enrollment in the history of the Warren District the various schools will open for the 1916-1917 season tomorrow morning and the far famed summer vacation for Bisbee's youth will come to an end. If indicated can be relied upon the coming season, for the schools, will be the most important and the heaviest in point of interest and results ever had by like institutions in this section of the country.

Monday is Labor Day and on account of the absence, in the school laws, of anything definite on the matter, the schools will meet, classes will be enrolled, work assigned for the following day and the schools adjourned. Should the board of trustees declare Monday a full holiday the teachers would lose a day's salary and the students the benefit of one day's advance.

Last year, at the beginning of school, the enrollment was 1800 pupils. Superintendent Philbrook expects the number to reach 2000 tomorrow.

Schools Still Crowded. In spite of the increased capacity in various schools of the District it is expected that several will be badly crowded; if not at the start then later in the school year.

Lowell, Central and Don Luis schools, undoubtedly, will be overburdened with pupils. At Don Luis the additional room, which has been under construction for several weeks, has not been completed and until it has been that institution is certain to be crowded. There appears to be no hope of relief at Lowell or Central.

At Warren the situation has been relieved materially by the erection of the new building. School will open there Monday morning in every grade. This building will also accommodate the children from Bakerville, Cochise and Mason Addition. Children in the first four grades, and living east of Arizona street, in Warren, will go to the old Warren school, the balance going to the new institution.

The new school at Warren has not been named and can not be called the Warren school as the building, at

W. G. Duke, a miner at the Holbrook shaft promises to resign his job if the popularity accorded a little Irish love song recently composed, continues to other pieces already being conjured up in the musical mind of the young miner. ZEPPELIN BROUGHT DOWN IN BIG RAID ON EAST ENGLAND

LONDON, Sept. 2. (4:30 a. m.)—One of a squadron of German Zeppelins which raided England tonight with London and the eastern coast apparently as their objective was brought down in flames, an official announcement says. Many bombs were dropped but no reports of casualties has been received.

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
