NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Diminution of public interest coupled with persistent encroachment brought about unsettlement to today's stock market. Operations ran beyond a million shares for the twelfth consecutive full session, largely at the expense of quoted values.

Recessions were not severe except in some highly speculative issues. The leading copper were consistently strong, Anaconda rising 3 1/2 points to the new record of 46 1/2.

Pressure was directed against the rails soon after the strong opening, later extending to U. S. Steel which fluctuated between 108 1/2 and 107, closing at 107 1/2, a net loss of 1/4 point. Rails partially recovered in the feverish short covering of final dealings. All other important stocks finished well above minimums.

Shipping shares were backward throughout. Mexicana, some of the equipments, minor industrials and munitions denoted liquidation, the feature of the latter class being Driggs-Seabury, which made an abrupt break of 17 1/2 points to 94 1/2.

The day's news had little effect upon market conditions. Recent sessions indicated increases of short interests. Total sales amounted to 1,150,000 shares.

Bonds remained firm on larger and more general offerings. Total sales, per value, \$5,170,000.

U. S. Bonds were unchanged on call.

CHICAGO GRAIN.
CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Reports that the prices of Rumania were in a nervous condition tended to lift the price of wheat today but most of a Rumanian victory near the Black Sea acted later as an offset. The market closed steady 1 1/2% for December and 1 1/2% for May and with the market as a whole 1/2% off in 1/4 as compared with yesterday's finish. Corn closed unchanged to 1/4 at 5 1/2, lower oats at an advance of 1/4 to 1/4 and provisions unchanged to 25 higher.

Bulls in wheat seemed to be dissatisfied for awhile to put considerable stress on admissions from London that Rumania had been caught at a disadvantage by Bulgarian attacks in the southeast. These admissions were coupled with Russian advices that at best it was not expected the Dardanelles would be open in time to allow any shipments this season. Besides, gossip was current that foreign governments were likely to give preference now to wheat from the United States in order to forestall a possible embargo in this country later on.

Disappointment over the comparative smallness of exports counted late in the day as a handicap on the wheat bulls. The total was only 400,000 bushels.

Fine weather eased down the corn market. Oats hardened in sympathy with advance at Winnipeg. Although provisions at first weakened owing to depression in the hog market, an upward swing took place later, influenced by inactive demand for lard.

Anaconda was the strong feature of today's market, recording a net gain of three points. On the whole market was erratic with general list displaying a sagging tendency. LONDON, Sept. 20.—An Athens dispatch to the Radio agency describes an extraordinary scene in the barracks of the Greek troops at Kavala after the Bulgarians had summoned them to surrender.

General Hadjopoulos, commanding the fourth army corps, called the officers together and explained that the garrison could do one of two things, surrender to the Bulgarians or to the entente.

The majority decided to give themselves up to the entente allies. The commander of the allied troops, replied he could not accept them as prisoners of war. Thereupon, General Hadjopoulos endeavored to take the corps to the Bulgarian side, but only seventy officers and 800 men followed him to Drama.
