

D. C. SIGNAL CORPS TO BEGIN MARCH TO NOGALES MONDAY

New Jersey Company Is Enroute Here to Join Them—Field Hospital and Battery Start South Tomorrow.

The Signal Corps company, District of Columbia guards, ordered to Nogales, is awaiting the arrival in Warren Sunday of a signal company of the New Jersey guards, from Douglas, when the two will march overland together to the border town west of here.

Captain O. S. Albright, late of the Thirty-fifth Infantry, and now of the Signal Corps, U. S. A., will command the two organizations forming them into a battalion whence they will be given active practice with the division at Nogales, and later be returned to Douglas from which they will be despatched home.

The companies will go by way of Hereford and Huachuca.

Captain Albright is well known to the District of Columbia officers, being instructor in the officers' school at Fort Lavenworth when Captains Terry and MacLennan and Lieutenant Landis attended the school three years or so ago.

The field hospital, D. C. N. G., will start on their hike to Douglas from Warren Saturday morning. The change in the program ordering the men to hike instead of traveling in motor trucks, was designed to fill a part of the organization's program of practical field service. They likely will pass Saturday night at Forest enroute. It is understood the members will be distributed among the various army hospitals for training, when they reach Douglas.

Battery B. D. C. N. G., held sub-calibre practice on the range at Camp Greenway yesterday, carrying out the regular problems as indirect firing on a reduced scale. The battery will start for Douglas Saturday morning, encamping at Forest enroute, and are due to arrive sometime Sunday.

GENERAL DAVIS MAKES CALL TO CAMP GREENWAY

Commander of Arizona District Pays Short Visit to Warren Yesterday, and Returned to Douglas.

Brigadier General Thomas F. Davis, commander of the Arizona district of the border patrol, with headquarters at Douglas, paid a short informal visit to Camp Greenway yesterday, being received by Captain Wilson, commander of the camp. Accompanying General Davis was his adjutant and several other officers. The visit was short, and the general volunteered no explanation for his call.

General Davis, it is said has referred the Warren District to General Funston for explanation for the transference of the Twenty-second Infantry from here, as well as to the possibility of getting the Third Infantry, District of Columbia national guards despatched to Camp Greenway upon their arrival at the border.

ARREDONDO QUILTS WASHINGTON; GOES BACK TO MEXICO

Ambassador Designate Believed Either Recalled or on Important Mission—Trip Is a Mystery.

(By Review Leased Wire) MEXICO CITY, Sept. 28.—General Candido Aguilar, the foreign minister officio announced tonight that Eliseo Arredondo, Mexican ambassador designate to the United States, was now on his way to the capital on leave of absence but that naturally when in Mexico he would discuss international relations with General Carranza.

LAREDO, Sept. 28.—Eliseo Arredondo, ambassador designate for Mexico, arrived here today from Washington on his way to Mexico City, where he will confer with General Carranza.

He will leave for the interior of Mexico tomorrow where he will spend about 10 days, he said.

REVOLUTION IS GROWING IN GREECE

(By Review Leased Wire.) ATHENS, Sept. 28.—The loyal officers and soldiers of the garrison in Crete who are said to consist of a third of the Greek force in the island, have requested the entente allies' consent to provide means for their return to Athens.

The island of Mytilene has joined the Venizelos movement, all the local authorities having placed themselves under the "committee of national defense," established in Saloniki.

RUSSIANS BATTER WAY THRU TEUTONS' MOUNTAIN FORTS

Despite Tremendous Odds, Czar's Men Conquer Mountain Heights Above Kerlibaba and Capture Many.

(By Review Leased Wire) PETROGRAD, Sept. 28.—The Russian commander, General Brussloff, has pushed forward his extreme left to the highway running between Kimpolung and Maramares Sziget, cutting that important Austro-German line of communication above Kerlibaba. After a series of desperate battles, Russians succeeded in capturing a mountain overlooking the highway, which gave them an important strategic advance. At the same time they took a range of mountains overlooking Kirlebababa.

Immediately north of this district, Russians formed ahead to the upper reaches of the Charny-Choromesh, where the stream bends southward to Kutj (Bukovina).

The extremely difficult mountainous country is offering every advantage to the defenders and the advance has been made against tremendous odds.

A noteworthy success has been accomplished by General Brussloff's center on the upper Sereth, where Russians have made an advance in the face of strong German reinforcements, capturing 1,500 prisoners.

DEMPSEY SCORES K. O. ON HECTOR IN THIRD

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 28.—Jack Dempsey of Salt Lake City knocked out Young Hector of Denver, in the third round of a scheduled fifteen round bout at Murray, Utah, tonight. Hector, who claims the heavyweight championship of Colorado, did not land a blow.

SWISS AND GERMANS MADE TRADE AGREEMENT.

BERNE, Switzerland, Sept. 28.—Dr. Arthur Hoffmann, foreign minister, today announced that economic negotiations between Germany and Switzerland had been completed satisfactorily. It was arranged, he said, that each country should supply to the other what was not urgently needed for home consumption, except such articles Switzerland had bound itself not to export.

FLEEING BANK ROBBER KILLED IN FLORIDA.

FORT MYER, Fla., Sept. 28.—Leland Rice, one of the four bandits, who robbed the state bank of Homestead, Fla., two weeks ago and eluded a sheriff's posse in a chase of several days by motor boats, was shot and killed today by Rolla Wiggins, when Rice came to an island for food. The robber stole \$6,000 and killed three of the possemen.

WOMAN IN TRIPLE SHOOTING INNOCENT AVERS HUSBAND

Hubby Sees Wife Greatly Wronged When Shot in Man's Room by Discarded Affinity in Philadelphia.

(By Review Leased Wire.) PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 28.—Mrs. Joseph C. Leduc, the sole survivor in the triple shooting at a hotel here yesterday, told her husband that her part in the tragedy was an innocent one and he accepted her word for it, and declared that he had never had any doubts as to her.

"I knew it," he exclaimed, after a talk with his wife. "She has given me the straight account of this distressing affair. She's true to me. She has not been in the wrong and I'll take her back to Chicago as soon as she can travel."

Mr. Leduc came here from his home in Chicago and went immediately to the hospital to see his wounded wife who was shot by Mrs. Harris Beltzer of New York, a discarded sweetheart of J. C. Graveur, also of New York. Graveur was instantly killed by Mrs. Beltzer when she found him and Mrs. Leduc in a hotel room together. Mrs. Beltzer then ended her own life.

After reciting the incidents which preceded the shooting to her husband, Mrs. Leduc gave a statement to the detectives in which she is quoted as saying:

"It is untrue that I registered with Graveur at the hotel as his wife. I left New York Tuesday afternoon after visiting my sister and came to Philadelphia to visit my nephew. After visiting my nephew I received a telephone call from Mr. Graveur asking me to meet him in the evening. I met him at the hotel and he invited me to go to the theatre. I had my baggage with me, and planned to remain here only for the day, intending to return to New York the same day. After inviting me to go to the theatre Mr. Graveur suggested that I leave my hand bag in his room and I agreed to do so.

"On our return from the theatre we had something to eat on the roof garden and about 1 o'clock I told him it was time for me to go to my nephew's home.

"I then remembered the hand bag in his room.

"We stopped by at the room to get it. We had barely stepped into the room and just as I was about to pick up the handbag near the dresser, a woman jumped out of the closet. She was tall and dark and I don't believe I ever saw her before. She had a revolver in her hand. She said nothing.

"She began to shoot. The first shot struck Mr. Graveur in the left side. I tried to rush to the door but before I could I was shot. That is all I remember."

Leduc was introduced at the coroner's office to Miss Andrew, a sister of Mrs. Beltzer, who had come from New York to claim the body of her sister. Miss Andrew said she could not believe that her sister did the shooting.

"You can realize," she said, "that I am just as anxious to uphold the honor of my sister as you are that of your wife." The authorities tonight said while Mrs. Leduc is under arrest, policemen are to guard near her door. "She will be kept here," said Captain of Detectives Smith, "until we have proof as to who did the shooting."

JAP AMBASSADOR DISCLAIMS TALK OF TROUBLE WITH U. S.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Responsibility for any statement that after the European war Japan would renew negotiations with the United States over immigration and alien land legislation was disclaimed by the Japanese ambassador today in a statement issued by the ambassador.

Mr. Tanaka declared that Baron Sakatani the former Japanese foreign minister, who has suggested in speeches at New York that Japan would take up these alien acts again, after the war is over, was not authorized to speak for the foreign office, and was speaking as a private person.


