SOUTH PLAYS NORTH ON GRIDIRON TODAY

Several Western Teams Also Clash on Eastern Fields. West Is Strong.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Inter-sectional contests will be the feature of eastern games to be played tomorrow. Five of the leading southern university clubs will compete upon gridirons in this section. The University of Virginia will play Yale, over which it triumphed by a 10 to 0 score last year. Princeton will have North Carolina as opponent; West Virginia plays Washington and Jefferson; Western Maryland faces Fordham while the Army will meet Washington and Lee University. The west also will be represented, for Ohio University will oppose Syracuse in the stadium of the latter university.

The records of the invading southern and western eleven last year show great scoring power and strong defensive strength, and as they have retained a majority of their 1915 veterans, it is expected that the home combinations will be forced to uncover something more than practice football.

Among the more important east vs. east games, Harvard will meet Tufts; Pennsylvania will play Franklin and Marshall; Navy faces Georgetown; Colgate tackles Maine; Brown has Trinity as an opponent; Williams opposes Union; Columbia goes up against Hamilton; Pennsylvania State meets Cornell and Lafayette plays Swarthmore.

FIFTH GERMAN WAR LOAN HUGE SUCCESS.

BERLIN, Oct. 6.—Although no general summary of the subscription to the fifth war loan is yet available as to totals in various cities, the amounts subscribed by various banks are some what higher than the corresponding amounts of the fourth war loan. If the subscriptions maintain the same ratio as those in the cities, the indications are that the fifth loan will exceed the fourth, although not reaching the high water mark of the third.

PREMATURE AGING OF MEN AT FRONT Baffles Science

What Will Be the Effect on the Future Generations, is One Question—Many Boys of 25 Are Grey.

LONDON—What will be the effect upon future generations of the premature aging of millions of men now at the battle fronts? Army physicians and men of science generally are beginning to discuss the problem. It is said that soldiers ten months in the trenches, exposed to the nerve-shattering shock of shell fire, often come out with the appearance of ten years having been added to their life. A shorter period than this often suffices

to turn iron gray the hair of a boy of 25 years.

This premature aging is peculiar to no one nationality. It is noticeably alike among the English and French lines and among the prisoners from Germany, Austria and Russia. It is said to be perhaps a little more pronounced along the eastern fronts where the vast amount of territory involved frequently makes neglect of the wounded inevitable. There are men who have lain for days without medical attention and when finally admitted to the hospital have given their ages as 21 to 27 years when ordinarily they would have been classed as 40 or 45.

"We attribute the gray hairs now so noticeable everywhere at the front to sub-conscious worry," said a Canadian army surgeon in discussing the subject with a correspondent of the Associated Press. "A man will not be conscious of any worry at all, whereas his comrades will daily comment upon the whitening of his hair. I have never known of hair actually turning white overnight, as the novelists are so fond of putting it, but it often happens within the space of a week or ten days.

"The theory of sub-conscious worry was borne out strikingly a short time ago in the case of a surgeon in charge of a base hospital. This hospital was miles back of the firing line and there could have been no actual worry as to personal safety or anything of that sort. The doctor could not recall any worries officially or personally, but all the time his sub-conscious mind must have been worrying about the folks at home or about matters to which he gave not the slightest conscious consideration.

"The gray hairs come quicker to the officers than to the 'Tommys' which is again a corroboration of the sub-conscious theory. The strain of the fighting naturally is greater with the officer, although he may outwardly have the same joyous spirit of the man with the gun who goes over the parapet with a delighted yell when the command is given to advance.

"Our nurses, too, frequently go gray without apparent reason for mostly they are women of long training amid the scenes and sufferings of hospital life."

M'CHORD CAPTURES OFFICERS' RIDING TEST AT DOUGLAS

First Cavalry Lieutenant Covers 68 Miles at Night Over Route Difficult Even in Day Light.

DOUGLAS, Oct. 6.—Lieutenant W. C. McChord, Troop C, First Cavalry, riding Mex, won the officers' night test ride over a course which according to an automobile speedometer, measured 68 miles, reaching the finish this morning at 7:05 o'clock.

Lieutenant J. M. Wainwright, headquarters First Cavalry was obliged to quit the race, his mount becoming too sick to finish.

Lieutenant Lewis B. Ballantyne, Troop C, New Jersey cavalry, riding Tom Barber, came in second, reaching the finish at 6:30 tonight, having been lost on the road.

Lieutenant H. A. Harvey had his horse badly cut running into a barbed wire fence on the first leg of the race last night and was unable to finish.

None of the riders had been over the course, which was difficult to follow in some places, even by day.

MEXICO FRAMES DEATH PENALTY FOR BANDITS

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 6.—The government today promulgated a decree providing the death penalty for robbers, bandits and those convicted of holdups. The decree is similar to the one issued by Benito Juarez and is for the purpose of putting an end to banditry.
