Miss Winslow was for many years a little factory girl in Pennsylvania until disabled at the age of nineteen. Since then she has educated herself and is now able to voice the appeal of the eight million women in industry. She is declared to be one of the ablest of women speakers in the country, and Mrs. Thompson expresses the hope that everyone in Bisbee will take advantage of the opportunity to hear Miss Winslow speak.

JUDGE SHUTE OF GILA COUNTY TO RESIGN ON DECEMBER 1 AT GLOBE

Prominent Jurist of Arizona Expects to Leave the Bench This Year—Will Practice Law in His Home County.

GLOBE, Oct. 16.—Hon. G. W. Shute will resign his position as judge of the superior court in Gila county and will enter upon private practice of the law here on December 1. This was the announcement made by close personal friends yesterday. Judge Shute confirmed the report in person.

The judge said that he had not yet tendered his resignation to the governor, but stated that he intended to do so at once, asking to be relieved on December 1.

It is understood that he will enter a law partnership with Archibald C. McKillop, a prominent member of the Gila county bar.

No intimation has been given as to who will be appointed as the successor to Judge Shute. Rumors of his intention to retire from the bench have been in circulation for the last two weeks and during that time several lawyers have been mentioned as his possible successor. None of these rumors gained any solid foundation, however, in view of the fact that it was not certain that the judge was going to resign.

Judge Shute is a native Arizonan who was born at Tempe and who has lived in this state practically all his life. He was admitted to the bar in this state and then took a further course at Northwestern University, a leader among the nation's law colleges. He served three years as district attorney here and went to the bench on February 12, 1912. Two years ago he was re-elected for a four-year term, having no opposition in the race.

Harvey Crawford to Appear at the State Fair With His Thirring Stunts—His Flying Is Miraculous.

A surprise because this is the first trip Crawford has made away from California as he was instructing the Aero Squadron of that state the last anyone heard of him, and an agreeable surprise as he is the builder and owner of a passenger carrying machine that he will bring with him on his trip.

The time has passed when we were contented to take our thrills at second hand. To stand on a fair grounds and watch the aviator fly away. Now we wish to experience the same sensations that have become so common to him. The easy rise, the rush of air as the machine spirals up and up. The heave of the machine as the pilot "banks" stiffly to the right or left. The earthward swoop as we descend and finally to enjoy the looks of admiration from our less nery friends as we step from the machine.

Crawford has been carrying passengers on the coast for the past two years and, he it said to his credit, he has never had a serious accident of any kind. He is admitted to be the most careful aviator of the Aero Club of America—that is when he has a passenger. When up by himself it is a different matter. Then he is the worst "fool flyer" in the country. He loops the loop, flies up-side-down, does the side slip and jelly roll and every other stunt that any other aviator has ever attempted. These things he will do at the Arizona State Fair when he is not carrying passengers.

The eleven who went out this morning were Ralph Belk, John Stone, Fernando Martinez, Uvalde Munde, Severo Menoza, Jose Rodriguez, Benito Ayala, Refugio Leon, Eusivio Ybarra and Jo. Dominguez. To the credit of the prisoners who are already at work on the road, it is reported that they are going at their task in earnest, as if working for day's pay, and not working out their time. Those who escaped were of the worst element and their riddance has been better for the camp. The men realize that good behavior will carry further than unruly conduct and they are conducting themselves in a manner that is pleasing to the county officers.

NEW JERSEY BATTALION LEAVES BORDER FOR HOME

DOUGLAS, Oct. 16.—Three hundred New Jersey infantrymen who had accompanied the provisional war strength regiment in its hike to Fort Huachuca, Arizona, were brought back to Douglas late yesterday in 22 motor trucks in order to leave with the remainder of the regiment for its home station in the east. The departure of the Fifth is scheduled for Tuesday. The Jerseymen are reported to have acquitted themselves well on the march, outkicking the regulars. With the exception of one private who has slightly injured on the march, none of the guardsmen left the ranks. The Colorado troops arrived this afternoon.

BENSON, SOCIALIST, RAPS PROSPERITY

Says Its Prosperity for Capital Only, and the Poor Are Sufferers by It.

FRESNO, Calif., Oct. 16.—Allan L. Benson, socialist candidate for president, spoke at the municipal auditorium here tonight before a large gathering. Discussing what he termed the "boasted prosperity" of the national congress, he said:

"We are not enjoying prosperity but suffering from it. Mr. Wilson says the wealth of the country has increased by forty one billion dollars. But both Wilson and Hughes know that the working class made that wealth and lost it. They cannot make this an issue, because both represent the class that got the wealth.
