GERARD TALKS OVER GERMAN SITUATION WITH PRESIDENT

Believed That He Discussed Means of Peace, but Ambassador to Germany Refuses to Discuss Interview.

LONG BRANCH, Oct. 24.—James W. Gerard, American ambassador to Germany, called at Shadow Lawn today to discuss with President Wilson what the ambassador characterized later as "every phase of the situation involving my work at Berlin." He lunched with the President and remained with him afterward, for more than two hours.

The ambassador said he planned to remain in this country until after the election but would take no part in the presidential campaign. He talked freely with reporters about various phases of the German situation, but refused absolutely to be quoted or to allow the publication of what he said. "I am representing the whole nation and cannot mix in politics," he said. Mr. Gerard would not say specifically that he had discussed the issue of peace with the President but in reply to a direct question, said:

"We discussed the entire situation." The ambassador said he expected to see the President again before leaving for Berlin. He declared he had not begun to make definite plans for sailing and would not do so for two or three weeks. He mentioned one boat sailing the middle of November and another the first of December as one he might take if conditions were favorable.

Ambassador Gerard said the German emperor was seldom in Berlin; but spent most of his time on either the western or the eastern front. The ambassador is understood to have gone over details of conditions in Germany with the President.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH MAKES FIRST STAND FOR PROHIBITION

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 24.—For the first time in the history of the church, according to well informed leaders, a stand on the liquor traffic was taken here today in the general convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church. A resolution recommending by the house of deputies placed the church on record as favoring "such action in our legislative assemblies as will preserve the interests of temperance and the repression of the liquor traffic."

The saloon was scored in the report of the committee headed by Rev. James E. Freeman, of Minneapolis, which considered the prohibition question. This said:

"Our age is witnessing vast and universal readjustment with reference to the manufacture and sales of liquor, and it is generally recognized that the saloon has become more and more a menace to the best interests of our corporate and individual life."

A report showing that the church has more than 1,080,000 communicants and 5,790 clergymen, was presented to the house of deputies by the committee on the state of church. The report also showed that about 1,000 of the clergy are not engaged in parochial work, and that there are about 53,000 school officers and teachers under the church with approximately 160,000 pupils.

Baptisms, the report showed, have increased by about 12,000 and confirmations by about 14,000 over the preceding triennium.


