Mile Suzanne Lenglen won her match against Miss Evelyn Colyer, a young English woman, who is described as a coming Lengler in straight sets, 6-0, 6-0.

KANSAS MAKES THIRD ATTEMPT AT TITLE TODAY

Kansas Confident He'll Get Benny's Scalp Through Knock-Out Route

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., July 3.—(By the Associated Press)—Michigan City tonight is on edge for its first taste of glove fighting in a championship contest tomorrow when Rocky Kansas of Buffalo, N. Y., will make his third attempt to wrest the lightweight championship title from Benny Leonard of New York.

There will be no weight made for the encounter, but the match will be for the lightweight championship so far as Kansas is concerned for he is confident he can win by a knockout. Leonard is a 2 to 1 favorite to win the popular decision and some shrewd critics believe he will stop Kansas before the scheduled ten rounds are finished. Kansas expects to go into the ring weighing about 133 pounds, while Leonard probably will be four pounds heavier.

With fair, cool weather predicted and indications are that between 25,000 and 30,000 persons will pack Promoter Floyd Fitzsimmons' arena. The gate receipts, according to advance indications, probably will go above the \$75,000 mark and may reach \$100,000. The sale of the \$25 seats alone, of which almost all have been sold, will total about \$28,000.

There is no apparent danger tonight that the contest will be stopped by the authorities. Governor McCray communicated with Sheriff Anstiss and Earl Rowley, prosecuting attorney, authorizing them to prevent the match if they are convinced that it would be a prize fight. These officials after investigations, said themselves that the bout will be a boxing contest.

Both the champion and the challenger housed in cottages a few rods apart on the Lake Michigan beach, are in what their handlers called perfect condition.

Kansas is confident that will stop the champion tomorrow. "I never went into a contest with more confidence," he said. "To get the title I must knock out Leonard. Benny is fast. He can hit and he is a master boxer. They say I am awkwardly clever. I know I can hit and a sock on the chin is a sock on the chin, no matter whether you are champion or not. If I can knock him out, I'll do it."

Leonard admits that Kansas is the most dangerous contender of all light weights, and is ready for the stiffest kind of a contest. "I am going against the toughest opponent of all lightweight contenders," Leonard said, "but I think I'm going to win. I know his ability to hit because I've fought him four times, three times as champion. I'll need speed, for Kansas can do 10 rounds at a furious pace. We says he has been ahead of me at the end of 10 rounds in our last two contests. He won't be ahead this time."
