

# TOMBSTONE TO HUSTLE TO GET STREET PAVED

### Contractor White Expects to Have Five-Mile Paving Job Finished in Ten Days

TOMBSTONE—Sept. 16.—That Tombstone will probably lose her chances of paving on either side of the highway to be laid through the city limits by the state highway department unless the board of supervisors arrange for the additional paving of the five-mile stretch toward paving of the five-mile ment given out today by Contractor White, of the firm of White & Miller, who are doing the paving job.

According to Mr. White, the firm expects to have the five-mile job of paving completed to the east end of the city limits within the next ten days and since the legal proceedings providing for the paving of Allen St., from first to sixth on both sides of the state paving job, have not been completed, owing to a set back, it is not probable that Tombstone will get its paving unless some other arrangement can be made whereby the paving can be made a cash consideration by the city. Since this is a step that is improbable, the only possibility that Tombstone has of getting its main street paved along with the state highway paving is for an agreement to be reached between the state highway department and the board of supervisors, Mr. White stated today.

It is highly probable that such an agreement can be reached, according to opinion of those who have been following the matter, and when the board of supervisors meets in Tombstone Monday the matter is expected to come up before them for consideration.

In the meantime whether or not Tombstone will get Allen Street paved hinges on the action taken Monday, according to contractor White, since if the agreement to pave the additional five miles toward Bisbee is reached, Mr. White stated that he will pave toward Tombstone as far as the city limits then go back on the other end of the work and by the time that work is completed the legal proceedings for the Tombstone paving will have been finished. He will then be able to take the job through the city completing the city paving the same time as the state paving is laid.

"If the additional five mile stretch is not paved at this time," Mr. White added, "we will remove our plant as soon as the present five mile job is completed through Tombstone, as we have another contract awaiting us as soon as we get through here."

## To Fill Place of Senate Candidate

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Sept. 16.—Governor M. C. Mechem, who was here today from Santa Fe, authorized the announcement that he would appoint, probably early next week, R. P. Barnes of this city, associate justice of the state supreme court to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Justice Stephen B. Davis, Jr., of Las Vegas.

Mr. Davis resigned several weeks ago to enter the race for United States senator on the Republican ticket and was nominated as the party's candidate by the state convention which met here last week.

Governor Mechem made a pre-convention announcement that he would appoint the nominee of the convention to the vacancy on the supreme bench. Mr. Barnes was nominated.

**KILL WEALTHY DRUGGIST**

## Ex-Chief of Federal Reserve Board Again Attacked in Senate

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—Attacking former Governor Harding of the Federal Reserve Board and "Wall Street" again today in the senate, Senator Hefflin, Democrat, Alabama, expressed belief that there was millions of graft in the new buildings erected by four of the Federal Reserve banks. He also charged that a secret canvass of the senators was being made to ascertain whether Mr. Harding could be confirmed if re-appointed to the Reserve Board.

The Alabama senator declared former Governor Harding, while head of the federal banking system "permitted four bank officials to set aside \$49,000,000 for four bank buildings," and added that \$30,000,000 of this amount, if not spent for new buildings would have gone into the treasury.

Should Mr. Harding be re-appointed, Senator Hefflin said he would present information which would "shake the confidence of senators in his integrity."

## Rivers and Harbors Bill Turned Back by House to Conferees

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—The house late today turned the rivers and harbors development bill back to its conferees, after declining to agree to the compromise proposal authorizing the government to pay \$9,000,000 for the Cape Code canal and rejecting out right the senate amendment by which the purchase of the Dismal Swamp canal for \$500,000 would have been authorized.

Prior to sending the measure back to conference, however, the house accepted the senate provision cutting down the ultimate expenditure on the East River project in New York.

## Manager of Filling Station Wounded by Youth in Struggle

PUEBLO, Colo., Sept. 16.—Oscar Kronke, 29, manager of a local filling station, was shot twice and perhaps fatally wounded by a youth said to be Elmer Beasley, late tonight when Kronke resisted Beasley in an attempt to hold him up and rob the filling station of its cash. Kronke thought that the youth was joking and attempted to take the gun away from him in the scuffle, Beasley fired twice and Kronke, it is said, at it happened several police officers were in the neighborhood and Beasley was arrested before he could escape from a crowd that gathered when the first shot was fired.

Beasley has been identified by Kronke as his assailant. The youth gives his age as 17 years and only recently was released from the state reformatory where he was sent following a robbery committed near Penrose, Colo., a few months ago.

## NURSE PLEADS NOT GUILTY ON MURDER CHARGE

### Florence Nurse Bound Over at Preliminary Hearing Without Bail

FLORENCE, Ariz., Sept. 16.—Miss Katherine Encinas entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Dr. W. G. Randall, of Florence, last August 30 when she was brought before Justice F. J. Stillman today for her preliminary hearing. Justice Stillman bound the woman over to the superior court without bail.

At the preliminary hearing attorneys for Miss Encinas gave no inkling as to the probable outline of defense. The case probably will come up for trial the second week in November.

Dr. Randall, formerly of Pueblo, Colo. and a prominent physician in Florence and throughout Arizona, was shot dead in the home of Miss Encinas here August 30. After the shooting, Miss Encinas walked across the street to the sheriff's office and told the officers she had shot Dr. Randall.

Since the killing Miss Encinas has refused to talk about the tragedy except to state and county officials, that she had killed Dr. Randall in revenge for remarks she said had been made about her Dr. Randall's wife.

## Employment Good on Santa Fe Railroad

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Sept. 16.—Employment conditions on the Santa Fe railroad are satisfactory and so far as that line is concerned, the strike of shopmen is over, according to J. R. Sexton, mechanical superintendent, with headquarters at La Junta, Colo., who was here today. He said that the company has plenty of carmen, but could use a few machinists, although the company is not suffering because of a shortage of men.

of St. John The Evangelist, and edifice which crowns a rising knoll—the church which he served as sexton, where his wife sang as one of the leaders of the choir and where a small but rich congregation worshipped, and where Rev. Hall had been assigned for ten years.

Mills said he entered the church and sat down in one of the pews. Near dawn, he got up and returned to his home, to find that his wife had not returned. Again at 9 o'clock that morning he said he wandered back to the church. On the front step he met Mrs. Hall, the rector's wife.

She asked him, he said, if he had seen her husband. He declared he countered by telling her his wife was missing. Mrs. Hall then went to the police station.

It was almost 24 hours later, that Raymond Schneider and Pearl Bahmer went to stroll in Russey's Lane, a quaint rustic way, known by young swains of the countryside as Lovers' Lane. The apple tree midway down the lane was the objective of their stroll. And there they found the bodies of the rector and the sexton's wife.

Police differed as to whether footprints found in the dust at the tree roots were made in a struggle. County detectives disagree with Coroner Long that the shooting did not occur under the tree.

Light winds had carried several of the notes and cards some distance from the two bodies. Mills, in his statement to the authorities, asserted that he had seen several of these letters and declared that they were written by his wife to their children while she was visiting in the southern part of the state this summer. The detectives declare they were written to the rector.

One of the letters, bearing no salutation and no signature, written in pencil read:

"You are a true priest. You see in me merely your physical inspiration. You are priest. Was pan religious? God makes his people to enjoy themselves deeply."

Another in the same hand writing read:

"Please do not laugh at this I know

The American flag was like a beacon of hope, hundreds that could speak a few words of English claimed to have been in the United States, but could show no satisfactory proof. Others said they had relatives in New York, Chicago, San Francisco and other cities. The Americans, however, were forced to turn a deaf ear to these appeals.
