MINING NOTES.

A. E. Rogers had a lot of ore from the Tintic run through the sampling works this week.

Dr. W. N. Sherman has commenced development work on the Alma claim, near Mineral Park.

John Popham and John Hudgeons are taking out some high grade ore from a claim on the south side of Burrum's Peak.

D. R. Bell will soon commence the leaching of the dump at the Signal mine. Mr. Bell says that the ore leaches readily and he thinks it will pay.

The C. O. D. mine is looking better than ever, and it is expected that the month's work will be a shipment of about 100 tons of high grade ore.

Superintendent Rogers has stopped the sinking of the shaft in the Night Hawk on account of the water, and the work of stopping out the new shafts has been commenced.

The Empire mine is taking out some very fine ore. Specimens sent in by E. F. Thompson show the rock full of native and wire silver. The richest ore assays something over 1200 ounces per ton.

Robert Patterson was in from Gold Basin this week. The mines at that locality are looking well. The O. K. Mining company will commence operations again as soon as the cool weather sets in. Prospecting for water will be continued.

Col. R. E. Beattie and J. M. Dawley are looking over the mines in Chloride district. Messrs. Beattie and Dawley are old practical mining men, and it is

probable that if they can find such property as they desire they will make arrangements to work it.

The Monarch mine has closed down and will probably never be worked again. All the force returned this week. No ore was found in the ledge, although water was found in limited quantity. Had they put their money into adjoining claims that show ore in paying quantities they would no doubt have had a goodly sum to their credit this year. There is no use trying to find ore in barren ledges, and it is folly to spend money on that character of work.

TERRITORIAL ITEMS.

Another big strike of gold nuggets is reported from the Bonanza mine in the Harqua Halas.

H. T. Andrews has resigned as secretary of the Zolick Territorial board of equalization.

Yavapai county stockmen complain of ticks and screw worms being very bad among stock at present.

Forty carloads of lumber passed through Yuasa during the past week, consigned to various military posts in Southern Arizona.

A son of Senator Everts has been spending the summer in Apache county at a cattle ranch of A. H. Pratt, near the Esquidilla mountains.

The fare on the Prescott & Arizona Central railroad has been advanced 10 cents per mile, making the fare from Prescott Junction to Prescott and return \$14.

The Cochise county Board of Supervisors have offered the reward authorized by the last legislature for arisian water. The flow must equal 17,500 gallons in twenty-four hours.

There are at present twenty-seven prisoners confined in the county jail of Maricopa, on charges ranging from petty larceny to murder. Of these, three are Apache Indians, United States prisoners, who are awaiting trial for crimes committed on the San Carlos reservation.

John Temple has been pardoned, and was released from the Territorial prison August 7th. The pardon was granted on the recommendation of Judge Wright, who passed the sentence, and of Judge Hazledine, representing the prosecution, the crime for which he was committed being an attempt to wreck a train on the Atlantic and Pacific railroad.

A passenger train on the S. P. railroad was derailed on Tuesday night of last week, near Benson. The locomotive and mail car were thrown from the track. The wreck was caused by the removal of the fish plates from the rails, which had been made by some unknown parties. The S. P. company offer a reward of \$1,000 for the arrest and conviction of the parties who caused the wreck.

A Constitutional Convention Illegal.

Attorney-General Miller has decided in a letter addressed to the Secretary of the Interior, under date of July 19th, 1889, and in answer to a letter of Governor Wolfley's dated June 20th, 1889, that the act authorizing the Constitutional Convention passed by the Fifteenth Legislature is nugatory and void.

The following is an opinion of 1835—Two opinions (of attorney generals) page 217 (General Jackson's administration): "The powers of all the departments of the regular Territorial governments are derived from the acts of Congress, making rules for such governments, and cannot be exercised only in the manner and within the limits prescribed by their provisions; wherefore Territorial Legislatures cannot, without permission from Congress, pass laws authorizing the formation of Constitutional and State governments."—Tucson Citizen.
