Senator Allen, of Nebraska, has introduced in the Senate a bill repealing all enactments in relation to coinage and reenacting the laws in force prior to 1873.

Bland's silver seigniorage bill has been reported to the house and will be strenuously fought by the anti-silver men. Nothing but a bond issue will satisfy the gold brig adherents in congress.

The elections bill was before the senate this week and some hot exchanges were indulged in by the members of that body. It is probable that the bill will pass as reported from the house.

Of course he might have an uphill fight against a dominant party, but we can say that silver would have no truer friend in congress than Bucky and few people in northern Arizona would work for his defeat should he become a candidate. If he was a democrat he could be elected by fully 5000 majority and if he runs on any other ticket there are few men in Arizona who can defeat him.

If any of the others had produced the same quantity the fact would be advertised throughout the land. 
