A test run of 140 tons of ore was made

proposition, were in Prescott Friday and

left that day for Denver. The run was
made with 20 stamps, but it is now the
intention to have the full 40 stamps drop-
ping in the future. Probably no mining
enterprise inaugurated in this section of
late years has attached to it so much
good for the future as hinges on the suc-
cess of the above mine, and as these gen-
tlemen expressed it, a large amount of
Colorado capital may be expected in the
near future for investment in this im-
mediate vicinity. The mine is said to
be looking well, and work is still going
