General Mining News.

Reliable information comes from Silver Bell, that the value of the ore bodies of the Imperial Mining company, now developed, measures up to over 8,200,000. This beats any showing for the amount of development of any copper mines yet discovered, or which are being worked.—Tucson Star.

President Lee Prau, of the Pfau Mining Company, while en route to attend a meeting of the stockholders of the company to be held in Cincinnati, had a couple bars of gold and a watch stolen from his valise at Ash Fork. The gold was extracted from ores from the Pfau company's mines, on Cherry creek.—Courier.

There are nine carloads of mining machinery and supplies standing on the switches at the Florence depot waiting to be forwarded to points between here and Winkelman, and many more carloads will arrive here before the road from here to Winkelman can be repaired. This illustrates, to some extent, the delays and inconvenience to which our mining enterprises have been subjected by the recent storm and washouts.—Florence Blade.

Henry W. Campbell, Harry Miller and O. F. Bacon, Chicago and Detroit capitalists, have purchased the Pine mountain mine near Walker, which has produced 200,000. The property has considerable development work and a 10 stamp mill. The new owners will work the property on a larger scale than it was ever worked before. The work will proceed from the main shaft, now down 400 feet.—Prescott Courier.

The biggest piece of mining news that Arizona has furnished in a long time is the announcement, on authority, that a great custom smelter is to be constructed in Yavapai county, on the Prescott & Eastern railroad. Work on the new plant will begin shortly, but its completion can scarcely be expected until late in the summer. Ore buying will begin before completion of the smelter, however, so that before many months the mining industry of the entire territory will begin to reap the benefits, as the capacity of the plant will be in the market for ores from all parts of the territory.—Prospector.

The Verde Power and Canal Company is figuring on installing a 20,000 horse power electric plant at their proposed Verde dam, and will submit to the power users of this valley and our surrounding mining camps, a proposition to deliver electric power cheaper than steam power can be maintained here, owing to the cost of steam fuel. If they can carry out this project successfully there is no doubt that they could sell all the electric power in this county, alone, that could be generated at their power plant. In less than two years there will be a demand for at least 2,000 electric horse power in this county, provided it can be furnished at a less cost than can steam power, or even at the cost of steam power, as electrical power is preferable to steam at the same cost.—Arizona Blade.

About 28 miles northeast of Wickenburg has been discovered what is said to be the only deposit of nitrate of potash in the United States. This property contains from analysis of the rock taken from the surface, a large percentage of nitrate of potash, also chlorine, lime, magnesia, soda and nitrate. Open seams in the rock are found to contain 90 per cent nitrate of potash. Mr. Cox, treasurer of the Nitrate of Potash Mining company, with office at Redlands, Cal., is now at the mines where the company is doing extensive development work. This company has eleven claims and connected with said claims is an abundance of water. The company is extending a tunnel 200 feet into the mountain, which will be about 30 feet below the place where the croppings are found, and will start tunnel No. 2 in a few days, which will open up four other claims that are separated from the other seven by a good claim belonging to other parties.—Wickenburg Miner.

One of the most important features of the Utah display will be a concen-

trator in actual operation, located in an annex. The concentrator will cost 10,000 and will be one of the most novel displays of the entire fair. Four men will be required to operate it. It will show the process of refining gold, silver and copper from the time the crude ore is mined until it comes out as refined metal. The rocks containing the minerals will first be crushed and then the different ingredients will be separated, all within the view of the visitors to the Centennial.

The Elder Neiman gold properties, situated between Troy and Kelvin, have been bonded to Los Angeles people. Under the terms of the bond the bondee has 90 days in which to commence work on the properties. We have not yet learned the full terms and conditions of the bond. Messrs. Elder and Neiman have done a large amount of development work on these properties, although both of them are poor men, and they have opened up some very large ore bodies which should have attracted the attention of investors long since.—Florence Blade.
