It is proposed to sink a shaft on the property to a depth of one or two hundred feet. The mine produced largely in rich silver-gold ore in the early days of the camp, but was abandoned several years ago, when taken up by John Jamison. The surface of the vein is covered with high grade float rock and many tons could be picked up of a good milling value. It is proposed to sink the shaft outside of the old workings.

Arizona Will Remain a Territory.

Yesterday afternoon, after two days of almost continuous speechmaking, the senate voted on the statehood bill. The Foraker amendment to the bill was voted on first and passed by a vote of 42 to 29. After the passage of the amendment Burrows, of Michigan moved to strike Arizona and New Mexico from the bill, which carried by a vote of 37 to 35. The elimination of Arizona and New Mexico and the passage of the bill for the admission of Oklahoma and Indian territory admits those territories to statehood without the necessity of the bill going back to the house.

Arizona is jubilating to day with almost as much joyfulness as though the territory had been admitted to single statehood. The bill merging this territory with New Mexico was one of the most villainous measures ever brought before congress. Not only was it an abrogation of the rights of the people of Arizona, but it was an injustice as well to the people of our sister territory. New Mexico has the population, the resource and wealth to entitle her to statehood. Her people are homogeneous and have laws and usages suited to their interests, which laws and usages would be irksome to a people differing with them in every essential, as would be the case were the two territories united.

Let Arizonans get together and work for the upbuilding of the territory, the increasing of her population, the development of her wonderful resources and inside of five years we will have more than 500,000 population and hundreds of millions of taxable property, which will make our plea for single statehood heard by the congress.

Last night, about 10:30, the rear room of the H. H.
