J. N. Cohenour came in from Vivian Thursday last on his way to Stockton Hill, where he will accept a situation with the Arizona-Mexican Mining and Smelting company.

Mrs. Henry Lovin returned early this week from Los Angeles, where she had her little daughter under treatment for an abscess. The little one is fully recovered.

The Misses Gertrude Potts and Isabelle Blakeley came up from Tempe Sunday evening last, having completed the school year at the Normal. The young ladies have made great improvement during the year.

E. J. McNulty, superintendent of the Aztec Turquoise company, at Mineral Park, was in Kingman Thursday last on business. He reports work on the turquoise mines progressing satisfactorily.

Ninety-five Mohave boys, between the ages of fifteen and twenty, passed through Kingman last Saturday on their way to Williams, where they have been engaged to work in the gravel pit for the railroad company.

The Santa Fe railroad company is building an ice and cold storage building on the west of the Harvey House at this station. The building is to be large enough to accommodate all the needs of the company at this place.

The big steam shovel is at work in the gravel pit below town and about sixty cars of gravel are sent out daily. The capacity of the machine is about seventy cars. Two hundred men are at work in the pit and grading out for the new dressing along the roadbed.

Henry Lovin, G. W. Beecher, A. F. Harris and J. P. Gideon departed Wednesday to Prescott, where they will appear before the U. S. court in the capacity of jurors and witnesses. Mr. Lovin has been sued by the government on account of the purchase of certain wood at Goldroad, which is said to come under the timber regulation. The Indians have been cutting mesquit wood in the valley of the Colorado river and selling it at Vivian and other places. Mesquit has been adjudged to be timber by the government and anyone purchasing it when cut on government land is to be prosecuted. Mr. Lovin denied that he purchased the wood and is fighting the case in court. In the first place it is a great stretch of the imagination to class mesquit as timber, as it comes in the same class as the catclaw, mountain mahogany, prickly ash and other scrub trees of this country.

It is reported that Capt. I. C. Conkey is very ill at the California hospital, Los Angeles. His many friends in this county will learn this with genuine regret.

The territorial board of equalization has assessed the Western Railway of Arizona (the old A. & U.) for the sum of 76,500\$. This is the first assessment levied against this piece of road.

R. E. Wilson, traveling agent of the Santa Fe industrial department, was a pleasant caller at the MINER office Tuesday last. Mr. Wilson visited Stockton Hill section and is quite enthusiastic over its mining possibilities.

A man by the name of Reis, who was in the wreck at McConico, a few months ago, has sued the Santa Fe railroad for something over 9,000\$. The man was in a car with some household goods, and also had a horse and burro in the car with him. The household goods were somewhat damaged, but neither the man or the animals were injured in the slightest.

It is reported that Yavapai county is soon to make claim to a part of Mohave county lying along the eastern border, near Nelson. The line at that place is about one mile east of the lime kiln, but it is claimed that this line should be one mile west. How this conclusion has been arrived at is unknown. The line was surveyed by a joint commission and the boundary posts set as far south as the Willows section.

Rev. Father Cyp. Vabre, of this parish, has a well written article in the June Pioneer, on the great Yucca forest, between Yuca and Bill Williams Fork. This forest is one of the most remarkable in Arizona, extending over an area of 600 square miles. In March, one year ago, the forest was a mass of bloom and later bore so much fruit that the trees broke down under its weight. This fruit is a sugary mass, which the Indians in years gone by used to press into cakes and lay away for winter use. A number of years ago representatives of English paper mills examined the forest with the view of putting in a pulp mill and using the wood in making paper pulp, but they gave it up on account of the lack of water in that locality.

Grand Canyon of the Colorado

This view was taken near the mouth of Diamond Creek. The walls of the canyon are 5,000 feet in height and are almost perpendicular. The two walls including the mightiest river of the west are less than 400 feet apart. A New York company is trying to get a franchise to build a railroad from Peach Springs into this part of the canyon. It will be but twenty-three miles in length.

The geological survey has made many changes in the geographic names in Arizona. The name of the Chemehuevi mountains has been changed to Mohave mountain. This range of mountains is east of the Colorado river and south of the Sacramento wash. At the present time it is the scene of a mining excitement. Another change is that of the Ute mountains, in the north part of the county, to that of Black mountain. In the Grand Canyon the changes have been many and important.

M. G. Burns, who represented Mohave county in the territorial council a few years ago, was wedded to a Miss Johnson at Prescott, one day last week.

S. W. Woods, at one time a resident of Mineral Park, is now superintendent of the Vivian Mining company, at Vivian. Mr. Woods had charge of the Mineral Park mill in the latter part of the seventies and is well and favorably known to many of the old timers of this section.

J. C. Goodwin came in from Wallapai mountain Monday last, bringing with him about 100 pounds of honey, secured from a big tree near Wheeler's Wash. He reports that section overrun with honey bees and that the honey is the best in the world.

A Washington dispatch says it will cost the government 300,000\$ just to secure the blank paper on which to print the supply of paper currency for 1907. This will prove a good investment, however, because Uncle Sam will manufacture the paper into notes and bills with a face value of 765,000,000\$. The biggest item in this total is the 5\$ denomination, of which there will be 148,000,000; there will be 93,000,000 1\$ bills and 140,000,000 of 5\$ gold certificates. Bills of larger denominations are fewer in proportion.

Howard W. Throckmorton, secretary to George C. Boldt, son of the owner of the Waldorf-Astoria hotel, of New York City, claims to have been set upon and stabbed near the heart by two Mexicans, in Los Angeles early Wednesday morning. Throckmorton says he fired two shots at his assailants, but failed to hit them. He was not badly injured. Throckmorton was secretary of the Wallapai Development company, which operated in this county. He was an assayer in Denver at the time, but getting into difficulties there took hasty departure to New York City. Young Boldt recently eloped with a young Mexican girl from San Diego and was married in Yuma.
