Arthur Edwards, formerly a resident of Kingman, but now a business man of Needles, is here looking after business matters.

The Misses Belle Maguire and Mary Carrow will leave tonight for Los Angeles, where they will take in the Fiesta sights next week.

E. J. Murdock, a brother of the late James A. Smith and Mrs. J. N. Wilson, arrived in Kingman last Sunday and remained one day visiting with his relatives.

A Ladies Aid Society was organized at the parsonage last Thursday afternoon. The next meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. M. E. Cohenour on Thursday afternoon next.

James G. Kenney, superintendent of one of the Osborne-Wardwell groups of mines, in the Bill Williams Fork country, is in Kingman. He expects to be called to Los Angeles in a few days on important business.

The Commercial is to open its dining room to the public tomorrow evening. Miss Julia Tast, who presides over this hostelry, is one of the best caterers in the territory and we predict for the house a large patronage.

J. F. Withers and R. W. Hunt departed to Los Angeles last Wednesday evening. Mr. Hunt has been ill for some time and goes to the city to consult a specialist, while Mr. Withers has gone in on important business.

Tarr & McComb have furnished the poles and supplies for the Cedar-Yucca telephone line. Poles are being set and wires have been strung three or four miles out from Yucca and the line will be open for business within two weeks.

Assays obtained from one of the mines of the Potts-Hogan group, in the Union Pass section, gave big results in gold, some of them running as high as 2,000\$ to the ton. Mr. Hogan went out to make additional locations last Thursday.

Herbert W. Yoe, at one time a resident of this county, was wedded to Miss Lodaes Patton, at the home of the bride's parents in Fairpoint, Ohio, on the 24th of last month. Mr. Yoe is with the geological survey. His many friends here wish him and his bride a long and happy married life.

I. M. George this week received from the Aurora, Ills., Well Works company a deep well boring machine and will soon have it in operation in Kingman. He has several orders for wells and will bore them to a depth of about two hundred feet. Any one wanting well work done had better consult him on the subject.

John Bomhoff, who has been in the employ of the Gaddis & Perry company for the past two years, will leave this evening for Los Angeles, where he will probably remain. While a resident of Kingman he made many warm friends by his courteous treatment of all with whom he came in contact and the good wishes of these friends go with him wherever he may go.

The Needles smelter is out of commission, the big blower having burst under pressure. Owing to the inability to get the casting within a reasonable time it may necessitate the closing of the plant until next September. In the meantime the mines in this county will be exploited several hundred feet below the present level. Hoisters will be put on the Banner and Champion mines and later a milling plant will be erected at the Champion. Either a tram or a narrow gauge road will be built into the Champion from the main line of the Chloride road.

**Knights of Pythias Grand Lodge.**

The grand lodge Knights of Pythias of Arizona will meet in Kingman next Wednesday in annual convention. About one hundred visitors will arrive Tuesday night and will be taken care of by the local committee. Kingman people will do everything in their power to make the stay of the visitors a pleasurable one. On Wednesday night a number of Knights will travel over the burning sands of the plains of Kohrassan to the feast, within the Temple of El Yemamah.

John Boyle, Jr., returned from Los Angeles last Monday and has gone out to Cerbat to look after the interests of the Cerbat Mountain mining company. John Boyle, Sr., departed Tuesday last to St. Louis, where he has many important business interests.

George Hanson came in from the Pyramid and Union Pass sections last Tuesday night. He reports that last summer what is supposed to have been the remains of William Fitch, the old prospector who disappeared two years ago, was found in a big canyon some miles south of Cottonwood Island. Identification was made by the clothing and peculiarities of the bones of the skeleton.

Col. Thomas Ewing was in Kingman Tuesday last looking after the shipment of his heavy freight by team from this place to the Victor mines. Ten cars of lumber and machinery have already been received and the big teams have been hauling it away as fast as possible. Sunday last three big teams came in from Prescott and loaded out the following day. It is expected that all the freight will have been taken to the mines by the first of June.

Juan Pino, one of the old Santa Fe operators, was brought before Judge Robertson, of the Probate Court, and his mental condition was inquired into. After an examination by Drs. Cowie and Tilton the poor fellow was declared insane and committed to the asylum at Phenix. He stated to the court that for the past six years his head had been bothering him and was perfectly willing to go to the asylum, as he thought that he could be much benefited by a treatment by a specialist. Deputy Sheriff Ayers departed with Pino Thursday morning.

The Santa Fe land department has engaged the services of an expert in the science of dry farming and anyone interested in the subject can obtain all the information necessary by applying to the department. Later, the expert will travel along the line, giving instruction to those who may want it and who may engage in the business of farming the lands contiguous to the railroad. Mohave county has many hundreds of thousand acres of land that might be brought under cultivation by this method.

The Santa Fe has placed their summer excursion rates in effect. The rate to Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, San Diego, Coronado and return is 18 60\$; to Santa Catalina, 20 85\$; to San Francisco, via Bakersfield, 27 30\$.

O. P. Posey, W. E. Mitchell, John Searles and Max Miller had a narrow escape from death on the desert of eastern California, near Willow Creek. The men had gone into Greenwater in an auto and there took horses for a trip to Willow Creek to look at mining property. Not showing up at Willow Creek a search party was sent out and found them in a deep canyon far off their road and almost dead from thirst. The rescuing party gave them water and brought them back to Greenwater, where they arrived after thirty-four hours of suffering. O. P. Posey is a big owner in the Gold Road mine, in this county, and Max Miller is the son of Senator Warren Miller of New York, who at one time had a working bond on the Golden Gem mine, at Cerbat.

An open switch caused a bad accident at Drake, a station twelve miles south of Kingman, last Monday evening. A freight train pulled out of Kingman yards a short time ahead of No. 1, west bound passenger train, and was going so fast when it struck the main line that the rear brakeman was unable to board it after closing the switch. When the freight got to Drake it took the siding and the train men, believing that the rear brakeman was aboard, paid no attention to closing the switch. When the passenger train came bowling along it crashed into the rear end of the freight, crumpling into matchwood the caboose and two stock cars, loaded with mules. Twenty-two mules were killed outright and twenty-seven were released from the wreck, many badly injured, and allowed to roam over the prairie. The engineer and fireman jumped before the crash came and were slightly injured.

Dispensers of wet goods are getting wise since a certain ordinance was passed at the regular meeting of city council April 1. There are provisions in said ordinance against selling liquors to persons under the influence of liquor, to habitual drunkards and those who are restricted from drinking by reason of notice having been served on saloons by next of kin. Failure to comply with the provisions of the ordinance in any single instance means a heavy fine, etc., hence the caution exercised by mixologists. In each barroom is a large card issued by the city to said places. This card bears a caption at its head, other information at the foot and the blank space between is left for the insertion of names of those who have been named in letters sent to the saloons by either mother, father, wife, brother, sister or guardian of said persons to whom liquors shall not be sold. The list, as yet small, is not confined to the poor element. There are others higher up in the standard of social life, who cannot exercise the drinking habit, often forgetting to stop in time.—Tucson Star.
