W. H. Rogers, who has charge of the property of the Stockton Hill mining company, was in Kingman a few days this week.

Foster S. Dennis came up from his mill at the Berkely mine Sunday last and returned to the property Tuesday evening. The mill is running steadily on good ore and making a high grade of concentrates.

H. K. Wheeler, the well known mining engineer of Los Angeles, arrived in Kingman Thursday last and has gone to Vivian, where he will do some work for Carl Schader and others.

George W. Schneider, of Denver, has been making an examination of the mines of the Union Pass country this week. He is much taken with the looks of the country and its big mineralized veins.

John Stoner, who at one time resided at Stockton Hill, is now a resident of San Diego and is said to be quite wealthy. Some time ago he sold his mines in the Eldorado Canyon country for a good big sum.

Lew Stirzel came in from Cerbat Monday last quite ill with inflammation of the bowels. He is now getting along nicely and will soon return to Cerbat, where he is superintending the operations of the St. Louis Con. Mining company.

Stages now run daily from Kingman to Goldroad, Cerbat and Stockton Hill, and semi-weekly to Sandy and Signal. From Yucca a stage runs twice-a-week to Cedar and once-a-week to Planet. All these stages carry passengers and U. S. mail.

Dr. W. E. Saule departed last Tuesday night to Los Angeles, whence he will leave in a few days for his old home in Nebraska. After a short visit he may go on to the Jamestown exposition and other points of interest in the east.

Rev. Aura Smith has been assisting Rev. Farr in revival services at the M. E. church this week. They are meeting with very good success as there has been several conversions. There will be services tomorrow at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. All are invited.

D. T. Price, Lovin & Withers' popular bookkeeper, departed several days ago to Noblesville, Indiana, where he will visit for some weeks. Before returning to Kingman he will take a trip through the south, visiting his birthplace in one of the southern states.

Dr. W. A. Hendryx, of Denver, arrived in Kingman Thursday evening and departed to Vivian yesterday morning. He is to put in a pneumatic cyanide plant at the Victor mill. Dr. Hendryx has been looking over the mining sections of Nevada and put in some of his plants in Goldfield and Tonopah.

O. F. Kuencer has gone to Los Angeles on important mining business.

The Santa Fe depot at this place is almost completed, all that remains to be done is to put in the office partitions, plaster the walls and move in the new furniture. The building is one of the handsomest on the line of the Santa Fe and reflects great credit on the contractor, J. Johnson, of Needles.

Practically all the newspapers of Arizona have complimented the MINER on its expose of the fake strike of gold ore at Gold Road some time ago. The MINER aims to give the truth regarding mining events in this county and while it is in the business it will give all the news from the mines of the entire county and contiguous territory.

The handsome Catholic church at this place has been completed and tomorrow the first mass will be read in the little edifice. Rev. Father Connolly is expected here tonight from Flagstaff and will greet his parishioners in the new church tomorrow morning. No time has yet been set for the dedication of the church by Bishop Granjon.

Henry Lovia returned Wednesday evening last from Kelvin, Pinal county, where he has been looking into a business proposition. He was much impressed with the possibilities of that coming copper camp and believes it will be one of the largest in the territory within a year. Large forces of men are now at work and several thousand will be put on by this time next year.

L. M. Teale and J. W. Guinn, who have been prospecting in the Wallapai mountains, discovered a nest of wildcats in the shaft on the old Gatewood property, from which they took eight cats. Five of the older ones were killed and three young ones that had not yet opened their eyes were brought to town and are being suckled by an old mother cat at the Night-hawk saloon. As cats are now worth five dollars a head the boys did not make a bad haul.

E. T. Dunning, who has long been attorney for the Los Angeles Board of Trade, committed suicide by tying a rope to his feet and jumping into the ocean at Port Los Angeles, last Wednesday night. He had been suffering from mental trouble for a year or more, but it was not thought that he would commit any rash act. Deceased was well known in this county, having attended court here a number of times as attorney in the Mohave & Milltown and other litigation.

From Randsburg to Ballarat, in Death Valley, a distance of 75 miles, the Santa Fe railroad will build a road as an extension of the Johannesburg road into the new mining district, where the ore is assaying as high as 1,600\$ a ton. It will cross the bed of the Dry Salt Lake and skirt the base of the Darwin range of mountains, and will furnish an outlet to the new mining camps that are being established in the vicinity of Bennett's Wells.

The tramway from the Golden Eagle shaft to the mill at Harqua Hala is now running, and the mill is now running on the ore from the Golden Eagle. The tram works very successfully. Foreman Bleck, so the News-Herald of Congress Junction says, thought that riding in the bucket over to Harqua Hala for supper was a great improvement over the old way of walking, until they shut the power off the other night and left Mr. Bleck stranded in mid-air between the towers. He crawled hand over hand on the cable to the nearest tower and climbed down, and since then he has walked to his meals.

A Comparison.

The New York Herald does not pose as a humorist, but it at least laid claim in that line when in recent issue it said:

"Early in the fall, one of two twin brothers living in Madison county, Kentucky, became demented and was sent to the insane hospital. The other twin accompanied him to the institution. Shortly after the two brothers arrived, the sheriff of Madison county received a telegram from the superintendent saying: "Two men who look just alike are from your county—one for confinement. Judge W. G. Blakely and Ed. Carrow departed for Prescott last evening where they go on business.

Under the new school law commercial branches can be taught in all the public schools of this territory, which may be considered one of the best provisions of law passed by the legislative assembly in many years. This same law also requires at least six months attendance by school children of some public or private school during the school year. The law heretofore required but fourteen weeks attendance. We hope that during the coming school term the trustees of Kingman school will make arrangements for the teaching of some of the commercial branches enumerated in the law.

The manner in which Arizona is growing in population and wealth is best illustrated by the growth of Cochise county. A few years ago Cochise county had less than four millions of taxable property and only about six thousand of population. Today its taxable wealth is given at over sixteen millions and its population at fully 30,000. Other countries of the south have grown correspondingly and the increase is still going on at a more rapid rate than formerly. From all over the territory comes report of the wonderful increase in taxable wealth, which means a corresponding decrease in the tax rate.

Yavapai county has sent its county surveyor to the Santa Maria to begin the work of establishing the line dividing that county from Mohave. The peculiarity of establishing the Meridian at Santa Maria is that the correct time will have to be carried in over one of the roughest wagon roads in the county, while if the start was made from Nelson, on the Santa Fe railroad, near which the dividing line is known to be, the correct time could be had from Washington and an absolutely correct meridian base established. Twenty years ago Will Foster and O. F. Kuencer established the line between Mohave and Yavapai counties as far south as the Fort Rock country, at which place there was a tax dispute. Yavapai county had been collecting taxes in what was then established to be Mohave county, but never since that time has it ever paid a cent of the tax illegally collected to this county. Now it thinks it sees a chance to collect tax from the lime kiln people, at Nelson, and are making a start where a slight difference in time may give them what they are looking for—a slice of this county.
