Mr. Tanner, chief engineer of the Frisco Mines & Power company, is in Kingman to interview a dentist. He says that the Frisco has one of the greatest ore bodies in the country and that the milling operations of the company are successful.

Tomorrow evening Miss Zoa Watkins will leave for Honolulu, Hawaii, where she has accepted a position in the public school of that city. The young lady is a graduate of Stanford University and is well qualified to fill any position in the public schools of the islands.

State and County Tax Levy.

The board of supervisors met Monday last and made the following levy for state and county purposes for the year 1912:

County general fund	1 50
County school fund	20
County road fund	25
Interest on funded debt	10
County jail building and interest fund	05
Total tax on 100\$ in county	3 0
Kingman school redemption fund	10
Kingman district	3 10

The board also reduced the tax as returned by the assessor of mines leaving the total tax 5,200,000\$. This will provide revenue enough at the rate to support all public institutions for the year without running the county short. Under the new law a greater revenue is provided for school purposes, each school receiving one thousand dollars, instead of 500\$, as provided by the old law, and compelling the schools to keep open full nine months every year.

The railroad well at this place has reached a depth of 230 feet and will be caled to the granite when completed. Water was encountered at a depth of sixty feet, which indicates that the surface water from irrigation throughout the town is fast going down to the primary water stratum. People that scouted the idea that sink holes and sewage might contaminate the water in the wells of the town may take note of the fact that the encountering of water in this well at a superficial depth is an indication of the fact that the water is following the flow sheets of this basin and may carry all sorts of contamination to the wells.

Kingman school trustees are figuring on the issue of bonds for bettering school conditions in the town. At the present time there are four school rooms, badly crowded and five teachers. It is proposed to either add another story to the present structure or else sell it and build an up-to-date school house in which high school studies may be taught. Kingman has arrived at a condition that demands better school facilities and the people owe it to themselves to provide them. An issue of at least 25,000\$ is necessary for the purpose, or else the sale of the present property might be taken into consideration and bonds issued for the difference.

Last Monday morning a broken rail derailed and wrecked two goods cars in a big train on the curve east of town. The train was west bound and it is probable that the big freight engine broke the rail, and when the broken part was displaced two cars were thrown from the track. Quite a number of cars passed over the break and took the rails again on the other side, only one pair of trucks having failed to keep the rails, aside from the two cars wrecked. Had the flyer been on time it would have probably been wrecked, instead of the freight, and had the broken rail been on the outside of the curve it would have resulted in a great pile up. The wreck delayed the passenger train about eight hours.

C. C. Welsh, contractor on the extension of the Chloride railroad, has a big force at work and the grading is going on rapidly. He expects to have the work completed within thirty days and the rails will be laid upon completion of the work. Tuesday last fully one half mile of the grade was complete, but there is some quite heavy work to be done from that point. The road is to be run up on the west side of the big wash and will enter the south part of the town, where a depot will be erected. The extension of this road to the town and on to the mines is a necessity that should have been recognized by the railroad company when the line was first built. The injury to Chloride by making the terminal more than a mile from the town has been incalculable. Now that the road will run right into the town we expect to see the Lead City of the county take on a big boom.

Court House Bond Issue.

The board of supervisors of this county is preparing a call for a bond election for the authorization of the issue of 100,000\$ in bonds for the purpose of building a county courthouse and furnishing the same. The matter of the bond issue will be put up to the qualified voters of the county at an election to be held some time next month. Voters must be property owners and their names must be upon the great register of the county.

Mohave county needs a courthouse badly and it is up to the people to provide the means of supplying the needs. With the present structure there is always danger of fire and the consequent destruction of some of the most important records in the state, besides which the building is incapable of housing all the officers of the county. For years the grand juries of the county have recognized the inadequacy of the county buildings and have put it up to the board of supervisors to provide better buildings, but at the time the board was unable to take action by reason of the congressional law limiting the indebtedness of counties. As Mohave county is now a county of the first class it is right and just that it should have buildings that are creditable to a big growing community.

Kingman's New Band.

Kingman is to at last have a regularly organized band, the members having met at the office of F. P. Andreas this week and adopting by-laws and constitution.

The members of the band and officers are as follows: C. R. Van Marter, president; F. P. Andreas, vice president; L. M. Teale, secretary and treasurer. Band leader, C. R. Van Marter; cornets, Chris Hoffman and Lonie Van Marter; baritone, John McKesson; bass, F. P. Andreas; trombone, Ray Van Marter; tenor, F. L. Hunt; alto, Lennie Bonelli; L. M. Teale. C. M. Dustin; drums, Hugh Smart and Everett Van Marter.

The band has secured the Happy Hour theatre for practice and will soon give weekly concerts in town. This band will be welcomed by the people of the town and it is to be hoped that it will remain a fixture.

Dr. A. L. Tilton is in receipt of a letter from Charles Shell, who is in Los Angeles, in which the information is conveyed that the Powse boy, who was shot by a companion more than a month ago, was operated on and the bullet located on the right side of the head, two inches back of the right eye. The bullet was too deep to take chances on removal, but it was found that a pus sac had formed, which was considered the cause of the paralysis on the right side. The skull was trephined and the boy appeared to be doing nicely, although there is only a slight hope for his ultimate recovery. The bullet from a twenty-two caliber rifle entered the head above the right ear. The boy has been unable to talk since the accident, but has been cheerful, and only suffered pain, apparently part of the time.


