Miss Olive Fancher, who has been attending the Normal school at Flagstaff, and Francis Fancher, who has been running out of Barstow, were called home this week by the serious illness of their brother George. The young lad is now out of danger.

The board of supervisors will meet on the 28th of this month for the purpose of awarding the sale of Mohave county road bonds to the best bidder. It is to be hoped that a large premium will be obtained on this issue of bonds, as they are gilt edged securities.

The Hercules Mining company this week shipped a carload of rich lead ore to the smelter. The company has been developing the property the past year and now has it in excellent shape. The mines include the Badger and Hercules, formerly owned by Samuel Chadwick.

Dr. Paul McIntosh has purchased an automobile and will hereafter make all the surrounding camps at least once each month. The only revenge the Kingman boys obtained was in running the Oatman lads almost to death, as is evidenced by the score of 24 to 3.

Jack Maddux is building a new blacksmith shop on his lots on South Front street and has removed one of his buildings from the corner on Fourth and Beale to the new site. He expects to build one of the most up-to-date shops in the southwest, including in it automobile repairing, brass foundry, lathe work and all kinds of wagon work. The shop will have every class of labor saving machinery that can be introduced to advantage.

Death of John Francis Moore.

John Francis Moore, aged 86, one of the oldest inhabitants of the county, died at his home in Kingman at one o'clock this morning, after an illness of nearly a week. He had been slowly sinking for several days and his death was not unexpected.

The arrangements have not yet been made for the funeral but it will probably be held tomorrow afternoon.

Deceased leaves a wife, three sons and a daughter, Wm. F. Moore, John M. Moore, Melvin A. Moore and Mrs. Clara M. Strause, to mourn his death.

Kingman people have always appreciated these entertainments, and as a compliment to our little city the artists have given them the best that their talents could produce. Wednesday last the stores of Lovin & Withers Company and Tarr & McComb were closed on account of the funeral of William Ware, father of Allen E., John H. and Samuel S. Ware, which took place in Somerset, Penn. Deceased had been a resident of Pennsylvania practically all his life, being a pioneer of the section bordering on the Maryland line.

The past week there was considerable excitement among the Wallapai Indians, owing to the disappearance of one Copache, an old squaw, well known to the white people. It was said by the Indians that the squaw had gone into the canyon south of town with a white man, who had a bottle of whiskey and that she never returned. The white man left town the next day. Agent Charles Shell, of the Truxton Canyon Indian school, came to Kingman and started the quest of the missing woman in earnest and it was soon reported from Needles that she was there at the Wallapai Indian camp, where the Indians were working on the Colorado river levee.

Frank L. Hunt and C. W. Herndon, Assessor and County Attorney, respectively, of Mohave county, returned Wednesday evening from Topock, where Mr. Hunt was holding ninety-nine head of mules owned by the Occidental Construction company, a Los Angeles concern. The company had refused to pay taxes on its outfit and as a result the mules were seized for the tax, amounting to more than 400\$. The animals were held at Topock the past ten or twelve days at an expense of about 40\$ per day, and on Wednesday, a few hours before the scheduled hour of sale, the company paid the tax and all expense and the mules were shipped back to Los Angeles. These mules had been leased to the government for the purpose of constructing a dike along the east bank of the Colorado river and when the high water came the animals had to be taken out of the bottom. The Assessor demanded the tax on the outfits, which was refused, hence the seizure. Every effort was made by the agent at Fort Mohave to defeat the collection of taxes on this property, but the Assessor, backed by the supervisors and law department of the county stood firm and made the company come to time. Even the U. S. Attorney was impoertuned to stop the seizure and sale of the stock, possibly on a misrepresentation of the facts, but the bluff did not work. Assessor Hunt is to be congratulated on the manner in which this tax matter was handled.

Dr. Paul McIntosh will start in the latter part of next month by making regular monthly trips to the adjoining camps, and will put in a regular office in each town. He will stay three days at a time in the outside offices, and give the balance of his time to his Kingman office.

Mine Tax Bill Passes House.

The mine tax bill advocated by the alfalfa interests of Arizona was passed by the lower house of the State legislature this week. The bill provides for the levy of tax on an assessment of 300 per cent of the net and 12 1-2 per cent of the gross. Just how these people arrive at this basis of assessment passes the ken of mortal man, but just leave it to the alfalfa fellows and they are sure to inaugurate some system that will prove a hindrance to mining in the state. Suppose there was a tax of 300 per cent of the net value of the orange and alfalfa crops of the Salt River valley as well as 12 1-2 per cent of the gross, and then the assessment of the lands at the value placed on them when the owner wishes to sell, wouldn't it jar the farmer? We rather think it would.
