# AUSTRIA NOT BITTER TOWARD UNITED STATES

BERNE, Via Paris, April 17.—The Austro-Hungarian government up to the last minute regretted what it considered to be the necessity of severing diplomatic relations with the United States. Although the attaches of the Austro-Hungarian embassy at Washington had been instructed to demand their passports in case congress declared war against Germany, or a state of war with Germany, the Austro-Hungarian government had hoped that a break could be avoided.

It is remarkable that the departure from Vienna of the American ambassador, Frederick C. Penfield, was not in any way directly connected with the reasons of the Austro-Hungarian government for breaking relations with the United States. In the last week in March Ambassador Penfield had received from the state department a cablegram instructing him to return to Washington to council with president Wilson regarding the situation.

Ambassador Penfield's departure also was intended to eliminate the peculiar situation existing since President Wilson thought it inopportune to accept the credentials of Count Tarnowski, recently appointed Austrian ambassador. The state department's intention was to leave Vienna embassy in charge of Counsellor Joseph C. Grew.

When Ambassador Penfield informed Count Czernin, the foreign minister, of his intention of leaving Vienna, he was given for the first time an intimation that the Austro-Hungarian government intended to break off diplomatic relations with Washington in case the United States entered into a state of war with Germany. The ambassador was informed, however, that nothing would be done pending the action of congress.

Mr. Penfield at first planned to leave Vienna April 4 or 5, but was informed that he would be received by the emperor April 5. On the day appointed, the ambassador was received by the emperor but the same evening the report was current that Mr. Penfield himself would be given his passports. The news appeared authentic to the ambassador, who, himself unwilling to investigate, asked the correspondent of the Associated press to ascertain if the report were true.

The correspondent learned from the highest source that the Austro-Hungarian government did not intend to hand the Ambassador his passports, even though congress declared a state of war and President Wilson signed the resolution. Thus the Associated Press became virtually the intermediary between the American embassy and the Austro-Hungarian government.

The government made all needed arrangements for the ambassador's departure, and to the last moment treated him as a diplomat going on leave of absence. Two representatives of the foreign office were at the station to bid farewell to the ambassador and Mrs. Penfield, and, in the name of the Austro-Hungarian government, presented flowers and other gifts to Mrs. Penfield.

The semi-official Fremdenblatt on April 10 pointed out in a leader that, with diplomatic relations between Washington and Vienna intact and intercourse between the embassy and the state department unchecked, certain military information likely to hurt Germany would reach the American government and this is considered one reason why the severance of relations became necessary.

To the very last the Austro-Hungarian government seemed loath to exert in any way control over American diplomatic communications. Mr. Grew, charge d' affaires, was handed his passports on Easter Sunday at 2:15 o'clock. In the afternoon, but the news was suppressed until the following Tuesday. The people of Vienna who had hoped to see a rupture avoided received the announcement with the great calmness. There was no demonstration against Americans and the Austro-Hungarian authorities treated them with consideration, waving nearly all passport and baggage regulations. In Austro-Hungarian government circles, the rupture itself was popular, according to the general belief. In the Hungarian diet the government was attacked by the opposition for having severed relations, but a statement from the government quieted Premier Tisza's opponents. Nowhere in the monarchy could antagonism against the United States be found.

That the diplomatic relations between the two countries had been severed appeared to cause, in fact, universal regret. The announcement is made high authority that the monarch

# FRENCHMAN TELLS OF LIFE IN LORRAINE UNDER GERMAN RULE

PARIS, April 2.—"I lived through 43 years of unflinching and uninterupted protest against German domination in Lorraine, and I can tell you that Lorraine does not want to be German," said Canon Collin of Metz to the Associated Press.

Canon Collin was one of the most notable residents of the annexed provinces of Lorraine; his name was third on the German imperial list of suspects to be shot when war broke out. The French counter-espionage informed him of the fact and he escaped into Luxembourg before the war began.

"They did me too much honor in placing me so high on the list," the Canon added, "for my sentiments were no more anti-German than those of the whole people of Lorraine.

"The policy of the population of both provinces for 43 years may be summed up in the word, 'protest,' in three degrees; first, official protest against German occupation and in favor of remaining French; second, protest against the interference of Germans in our local affairs; third, demand for the autonomy of Alsace and Lorraine; although there were different degrees and different stages, there was never any cessation or diminution of our resistance.

"After 15 years of this official protestation began the regime of dictatorship and passports, with the object of annihilating that resistance, but it was continued through the press and at the polls at every election. Protest survived the dictatorship, after which it continued in the form of what might be called 'particularism' or the idea of Lorraine for the natives of Lorraine.

"The Germans had so little confidence in the population that they imposed their own officials upon us. German-born people flocked into Lorraine and Alsace until they numbered nearly 400,000 in both provinces. It was then we demanded that the Germans get out and leave the place to the natives of Alsace and Lorraine.

"Our first hope, in spite of all, was to return to France, though at times we had the painful sentiment that France was forgetting us. We organized the 'Souvenir Francais' throughout Lorraine and it did wonders to revive French sentiment and reawaken French patriotism in Lorraine. The Germans broke up the Souvenir Francais, then we organized the 'Souvenir Lorrain,' which was the same thing under a new name.

"A third of the population of Lorraine knows not a word of German. About 100,000 know both French and German imperfectly while on the German frontier a German patois is spoken.

"The Alsations have been well called 'The Gascons of the North,' because of their ready wit. The people of Lorraine are colder and more reserved—perhaps more patient and persistent.

"The Alsations as soon as they recovered from the first stupor of the German invasion poked fun at the immigrants. The people of Lorraine drew themselves up in haughty disdain. They opposed the force of inertia—passive resistance to the aggressions of the invader and the German in Lorraine has never ceased to be regarded as in invader.

"There were more carpet-baggers in Lorraine than in Alsace. While every facility was given to them to enrich themselves at the expense of the country, the natives were officialy treated as citizens of the second class.

"We were considered good enough to be street cleaners and railroad hands; occasionally a native rose to the distinction of railroad conductor, but that was the limit. There was opposition to everything that smelt of Germany.

"The attitude of the Germans toward the population of Lorraine during the war is striking proof that they do not believe what they say of the loyalty of Lorraine to Germany. Arrests were made by hundreds of priests and notable citizens. A great number of women attached to the German police brought to Metz from Berlin and distributed among the population to surprise conversations, provoke indiscretions and give pretext for arrest.

"I am glad to observe," said Canon Collin in conclusion, "that America has realized that the menace of German hegemony was aimed indirectly at her."
