## "OUR FRIEND"--AMEN

Ever hear of him? A lawyer by the name of John E. Humphries? He used to hang around the Seattle Labor Temple and tell the workers how honest he was, grow eloquent in enumerating all the democratic laws he believed in and proclaiming himself the workers' only friend. Of course he was running for office. No order of business of any union was at all complete, unless fellow-worker Humphries had a communication before it, telling the union all about his fine points.

All this happened BEFORE he got an office. He is in office now. A judge of the superior court. And the Seattle Times loves Judge Humphries--loves him dearly. The Times can get injunctions from Judge Humphries. So Judge Humphries easily proves his loyalty to the workers and his hatred of the masters. Oh, yes. Note what he said the day after the riot: "I will state now to the mayor and the chief of police that whenever a restraining order is issued out of this court, it is to be obeyed. That is the thing for you to do--obey it. The only salvation of this country lies in its courts and the respect for law. Your duty was in the first place to obey this order. It was not for you to say that you would or would not follow the court's direction. It was up to you to obey, as law-abiding citizens. The court made the order in the regular way and there is a regular way to have it set aside."

"Now the thing for you to do, Mayor Coterill and Chief Bannick, is to call off your officers down there at the Times building. You can then abuse me on the side as you see fit. The Times Printing company came into court in the regular, lawful way by its attorneys and filed a bond of \$5,000, much more in my judgment than was necessary. They are responsible. So there is no use of quibbling about it. Call off your officers and obey the law."

Obey the law, was his advice to Mayor Coterill. OBEY THE LAW. OF course as a judge, he does not believe in riots and lynching. No, NEVER! But read this, also from him:

"That's not all that's to it, either. I tell you right now from this bench that if this same I. W. W. persist, the people, the loyal American people of this community, will call a mass meeting and the I. W. W. will have to leave the town or be hanged at the lamp posts."

"I am speaking advisedly here. I want to tell everybody that the American-born people are not to permit a lot of irresponsible, foreign-born men and women to come here and run this country."

The loyal American people, you will notice, are mentioned. We KNOW that Judge Humphries is one of these same loyal Americans he has in mind. Sure. And he is a judge. An elected judge. And HE and other loyal Americans will call a mass meeting and see the I. W. W. leave town or THEY WILL BE HANGED AT THE LAMP POSTS. He speaks ADVISEDLY. And this is FREE AMERICA. And he is a sample of our American judiciary. And HE believes in THE LAW. And HE counsels Seattle's mayor to OBEY the law.

And MUST WE, poor, deluded workers, trying to get one and a half mouthfuls where we got but one before, must we become LOYAL AMERICANS such as he? No! Or shall we be driven to become anarchists of the deed, opposed to such as he? NEVER!

WE SHALL REMEMBER THAT POLITICAL POWER PLACED HIM IN POWER, AND THAT HE IS USING HIS POWER FOR THE MASTERS' GOOD.

## More Dirty Work

(By J. E. Sinclair.)

With screaming headline and splash of printers' ink the Seattle Times on Tuesday evening announced that one Sergeant A. E. Wallace, who was supposed to have been wounded in the street fight when three soldiers attacked a woman speaker last Thursday night in Seattle had died of blood poisoning. His long drawn-out death agony was graphically depicted. He was sure good and dead and the street speakers were guilty of murder, announced the Times. The story was telegraphed abroad and furnished copywriters for other dailies of the

Meanwhile the doctors who treated the bruised and slightly injured military roudies wondered how a man could possibly die from such insignificant wounds. Inquiry at the military posts assured the doctors that all three men were alive and kicking. This inquiry also revealed the fact that Sergeant A. E. Wallace existed and that the story printed by the Blethen sheet was a fabrication purely and simply calculated to precipitate another riot and to cast infamy upon the workmen who defended a woman in her constitutional rights.

The psychological effect of such a story is well understood by the Blethen bunch and by all the papers that printed the story. Even where corresponders for other dailies of the Times type.

Los Angeles, July 21.—The following telegram protest against the riots in Seattle was sent today to President Wilson by Thos. W. Williams, secretary-treasurer of the Socialist party of California:

"Socialism is opposed to violence, whether practiced by the mob or resorted to by the government to suppress free speech. The stability of government is threatened when employees take license from an intemperate speech of a superior officer and endanger life and property. Over 1,000,000 Americans believe in the red flag. It is the international emblem of peace and brotherhood. To deport all these will be a herculean task. The disgraceful scenes in Seattle will do more to discredit our government than all the mouthings of irresponsibles. "We urge federal investigation and ask that you take steps to prevent a recurrence of this deplorable incident."

San Diego, July 21.—Accredited leaders of the Socialist party today sent the following telegram to Mayor Coterill, of Seattle, congratulating him on his stand during the recent disturbances in that city:

"The citizens of San Diego in mass meeting assembled under the auspices of the Socialist party congratulate you upon your firm stand against mob law and a prostituted press that incites to riot and bloodshed under the guise of patriotism. Milwaukee, Wis., July 21.—Referring to Secretary Daniels as a "jackass," Allen Benson, magazine editor, addressed 18,000 Socialists here at a picnic yesterday on the Seattle riots. Benson said:

"This is the first time the Socialists have been so fortunate as to have their cause aided by a jackass so near the head of the nation. Daniels' wild speech incited the riot in Seattle, which has already started a wave of indignation throughout the country. "The democratic party will lose 500,000 votes as a result of the Seattle affair."

## THE RIOT PROGRAM.

Staged by Seattle Times, Committee on Program.

Thursday Night. Several sailors and soldiers were punished by loggers who congregated about the corners of Washington and Occidental avenues, Seattle, for insulting a woman speaker who was speaking upon woman's rights. This speaker was neither a member of the Socialist party or I. W. W.

About this same time, Secretary of the Navy Daniels was making an impassioned speech to the elite of the city at the Rainier club, viciously scoring the red flag and its followers. It is said the editor of the Times unconsciously led Daniels into this error. Friday Night.

The hoodlum element of the U. S. soldiers and sailors, numbering about fifty, as a result of Daniels' speech and because of the beating given several of them the night before, organized a mob and started to destroy the property of the I. W. W. and the Socialist party.

Under full police protection and upon advice of police officers the I. W. W. headquarters on Occidental avenue was sacked, the furniture piled in the streets and burned.

The mob then went toward the Socialist party headquarters at 1909 Fifth avenue. Here they were met by County Secretary Jos. Golden and Mary Jervis, secretary of the Fifth Ward local. These two comrades effectively turned away the mob for the time being. On their way to 1909 Fifth avenue the news-stand of Millard Price was demolished. The mob then proceeded to the office of the I. W. W. in the Nestor building. Here all furniture and effects were thrown out of the window, piled in an empty lot and burned.

From here the mob returned to the Socialist headquarters, 1909 Fifth avenue, stormed it, wreck all the furniture, typewriter, piano, etc.; piled everything in the street, including literature, and burned it. Full police protection was given the mob.

The mob then proceeded to the headquarters of the deserting faction of our party, piled all effect into the street and set fire to them. It then hunted for the place of publication of the paper of the deserting faction, but was called off by the mob owner of the building in which this printing plant is situated who had been following the mob advising them to do a good job at the other places. It is said the mob also stopped before the Union Labor Temple and that only the presence of a large meeting of union men inside prevented them from ransacking it. Many of the rioters insisted upon destroying all the effects of every union and all branches of the Socialist party in the city.

## TRITE SAYINGS OF THE SEATTLE TIMES.

Alden J. Blethen, colonel and gentleman, champion of law and order, vicious opponent of vicious utterances on the part of the workers, throws oil upon the ruffled waters. "A few conservative 'patriotic,' 'honor the law' extracts from issues of our great paper:

"The sailors were entirely orderly last night with the exception of their attack on the Reds. Every I. W. W. headquarters in the city was raided and wrecked and every anarchist and I. W. W. who offered resistance was roughly handled."

"Anarchy, the grizzly hydra-headed serpent which Seattle has been forced to nourish in its midst by a naturalized chief executive for eighteen months, was plucked from the city and wiped out in a blaze of patriotism last night. Hundreds of sailors and artillerymen, who carefully planned the entire maneuver yesterday morning, led the thousands of cheering civilians to the attack and successfully wrecked I. W. W. headquarters and Socialist headquarters in various parts of the business district."

"Fired with patriotic enthusiasm and armed only with small American flags, the men in uniform wrecked the I. W. W. headquarters on Washington Street; demolished the news-stand of Millard Price at Fourth avenue and Pike street; cleaned out the I. W. W. headquarters in the Nestor building on Westlake avenue; and the Socialist halls at the Granite hotel, Fifth and Virginia; and in an old church at Seventh and Olive streets."

"Throughout the scene Patrolman J. L. Crawford remained one of the interested spectators."

"Although the sailors and soldiers expressed themselves as perfectly competent to handle these anarchists, the police held back the mob until the red flag adherents had clambered away."

"From officers high in command to the latest enlisted man, it was plainly evident today that no regret was felt throughout the Pacific reserve fleet over the sound rousing meted out last night to the treasonable mob."

"Though strict official regulations prevented open admissions of opinion, visitors to the flagship West Virginia and other vessels of the fleet were afforded ample evidence that the blue-jackets not only rejoiced in the destruction of the anarchists' headquarters, but were ready, should opportunity offer, to administer even a severer lesson."

## BIRDS OF A FEATHER FLOCK TOGETHER

Ask any man or woman in the northwest (understand, we said man or woman) about the Seattle Times, and you will be told that it is the most unprincipled, vicious and "for sale" kept union in this part of the woods. ## THE SEATTLE TIMES LEADS THE RIOTERS.

That some one very well acquainted with all the Socialist party and I. W. W. headquarters led the rioters was known from the very first. It was soon learned that employees of the Seattle Times led the rioters to the various headquarters. An employee of the Seattle Star is said to have assisted the rioters. The son of Councilman Haas was also one of the heroes. It is positively known that M. M. Mattison, political writer of the Times, marched at the head of the mob. We hope he has earned the lasting regard of Col. Blethen and that he may never be in want of crumbs from his master's table.

"It was shortly before 8:30 o'clock last night that the sailors and soldiers made the interiors of the various Socialist and I. W. W. headquarters look like a Spanish stew."

"For more than one hour after the court had issued the order for Coterill (mayor of Seattle) and his chief of police and the force in general to quit their interference with the operation of the regular affairs of this publication, this discredited, dishonest and loathed mayor of Seattle dodged and kept away until a complaint was made for his arrest for contempt of court."

"Sheriff Cuddee was requested by the editor of the Times and a county commissioner to swear in 500 deputies if necessary, to protect the Times in the publication of its various issues, both Saturday and Sunday—the period in which this would-be czar attempted to interdict the publication."

"So, squatting in his little puddle of self-esteem, this foolish thing struck at the fundamental principle of American liberty—the freedom of the press. "While undoubtedly the city of Seattle is responsible for the loss of the first edition of the Times on Saturday, nevertheless, no action will be brought against the city for damages."

"Instead, the moment that Judge Humphries is through with this injunction, the Times Printing company will bring a damage suit against this loathsome whelp who sits in the office of the mayor and attempts to destroy property, in the sum of \$25,000."

"And the Times will do this in spite of the fact that it will probably be illustrating the old adage—"Sue a beggar and catch a louse."

"The time has come when this would-be autocrat and czar should be deposed from the office of mayor."

"While the Times has been opposed to the recall law, it believes in it now, and will help enforce it to the limit."

"The Times calls on the business men of this city to join with it immediately to establish headquarters—to formulate charges and inaugurate a canvass that will secure not only the legal number of names for recall of this wretch, but the Times will subscribe \$1,000 to help put the campaign through."

"The time has come when this city should be freed from 'Coterillism' and all that that odorous word implies—and do it forthwith!"

"Let the law abiding citizens of Seattle, who have been handicapped for more than two years by a most wretched condition of affairs, get rid of this obstacle of progress—and get rid of him forthwith!!!"

great newspaper, an immense business institution, and I say, by way of repetition, that to order it suppressed was a very high-handed piece of business. "The Times is an institution of perfect solvency. It is responsible in the highest degree for all its acts. If it is guilty of libel, the way to redress is plain. "As I said before, it is a great paper, a great institution, a great factor in the upbuilding of Seattle and this country of ours up here. Then, to place policemen at the doors of that office and say to the proprietors: You cannot hand out a paper; is something that I want to hear about before I abrogate this injunction."

In the interim, there were frequent conferences between the sheriff's office and Judge Humphries, but the sum total result was that the court's order must be obeyed and to aid Sheriff Cuddee in carrying out that dictum Judge Humphries directed that the sheriff pick up, if necessary, a posse comitatus. These men would be armed with guns and would be empowered to shoot at the command of the sheriff.

Do you notice it? "Great newspaper," "Responsible in the highest degree for all its acts." "Great factor in the upbuilding of Seattle." We do not know whether the wages he receives as an official is enough to keep him in comfort or not. The fact is, that he is not engaging himself for Chautauqua lectures, like that other "commoner," Wm. Jennings Bryan.

## THE PROSTITUTED PRESS.

And now the Seattle Times is praising Wm. Hickman Moore, former mayor of Seattle, for denying the Socialist the right of free speech during his administration. At the time that this free speech contest was in progress, this same paper could not find words sufficiently caustic in criticism of Mayor Moore and his policy and administration. Why? Because former Mayor Moore was not a Times mayor. Coterill is mayor now, Coterill permits free speech. The Seattle Times calls him a "wretch," "a loathsome whelp," etc. Says he is in league with the anarchists because he permits free speech. Why? Because Coterill is not a Times mayor. With our prostituted press a question of principle is never at stake. Its entire activity circles around the question: "What is there in it for us?"

Seattle's Golden Potlatch! Fetich of metal! Tillucums! Wa, Wa. Modern barbaric ceremonies symbolizing ancient despotisms. Bam! balls! worship of gold. Idolatries and miseries of the ancients to satisfy small bourgeoisie with paying high rents in magic gold for another year, to take from the worker in a moment's relaxation that which through providence and lack of foresight had been left to him in over-abundant wages! Boozie! Patriotism! Bam! Balls! lights a Bear! Delete. Wa, Wa! Cinders and smoke, and the story is told.

All headquarters, libraries, book-stores, reading rooms, kitchens, city and county central and local offices of the Socialist party, all headquarters of the Industrial Workers of the World mobbed, sacked and burned with the police standing idly by like calves looking at a new gate. How quickly these splendid blue-coated heroes would have recovered their courage had the mob been long-suffering strikers marching or picketing under the law in a mere "bull's" effort to live! How quickly these tamed cowards would have become "bulls" had such strikers been madly bent upon the destruction of insured corporation property, and how quickly they would have found a way to shoot to kill, and to beat with clubs the abdomens of pregnant women, as at Lawrence! Never forget, O workers!

But don't blame the police. "Orders is orders," you know. Theirs is but to obey. Not a one of them could face any situation requiring iniative individual courage because men do not engage in their calling. They are but the black mercenaries of the moloch's realm, eating the bread of treason to their own people. They are but pitiful intellectual eunuchs in the harem of capitalism. Put the blame where it belongs. Blame the mutt of a mayor, the traditional "good man" the white-shirted and knighted mountebank, who to get his office tried to say that he was a virtuous Socialist, that he had the support of eminent "constructive" Socialists, whatever that is, who was a friend and sympathizer of labor, and who now cringingly whines that the police did right in not doing their duty because if they had someone would have been hurt. May the good lord or whoever it is, save the worker from his sympathizers, the vivisectors and analysts of his miseries from afar and who are never found in the trenches with him!

Don't blame Blethen! He's an aged lunatic tottering toward a mad house of bedlam and energetic fury, lashing himself with his wild imaginations, and stinging himself to death with the noxious venom of his own hate. He is merely a crazy King Canute sitting with his feet in the first waters of the forbidden tide. He is the outward manifestation of what is of real seriousness in Seattle, a bludgeon business organization to beat and to break and to kill all who of whatsoever walk do not submit. Blame the Chamber of Commerce and its whiskey buffet, the Rainier Club, an incorporated society of arrogant and stupid plutocrats, and blame the white-shirted and knighted mountebank, the M. and M. et al., who are banded together in a five year pact to stifle all organized protests against present day slavery. Put the blame where it belongs.

Don't blame the other newspapers, The Star, The Sun and the P. I. They are the properties of stock corporations and must do as they are told by their certified owners, in order to "make good" on the job. For the same reason you cannot follow any hope to the courts or to the legislatures. All modern industry is corporate now with certificates of ownership scattered like snowflakes everywhere but to you. You pass an owner of the very shop you work in, on the street and you don't know him, nor he you. You could hardly find a judge, a legislator or other public official who is not in this fashion a silent partner in some enterprise through which you are exploited. There is a class movement in a great class struggle as all historic movements are, and it is your mission and your destiny in it to set yourselves free from the most facile system of bondage ever contrived. Blame the class that opposes you as such. Study the sources of its power, see how directly it is organized, and try to would be free, seek power yourselves, and bear in mind that among our chains are ignorance, our fetters are superstitions. Let us rid ourselves of them, and stand upright at last!

Don't blame the common sailor and soldier. There is every reason to believe that a preponderance of sentiment among them is with us. There is every reason to believe that the articles of war. Most of them are in the service of potential murder because of the same stupid ignorance that for so long a time has hung like a gloom and a pall over us all. The chances are that if they were told they might have their discharges today three-fourths of them would be out of the service without their accumulated pay. It's very dear tuition but if you were a well read and well educated man you will learn that the service is after all a great anti-patriotic school. Never overlook that it was a common sailor from a warship in port and a member of the organization who stole ashore and warned us of the conspiracy of riot then being arranged aboard ship. Blame the eminent secretary of the navy whose foolhardy and genuinely incendiary speech to a private club of the arrogant network when published was the direct cause of it all. Although the papers as usual tried laboriously to fix primary responsibility upon the I. W. W. and the "red" Socialists it is now well known that neither had the slightest connection with it at the beginning or at any other time. The I. W. W. saw that it was useless to attempt propaganda on the street during the Potlatch carnival had withdrawn from the street. A woman's rights propagandist, Mrs. Annie Miller, took the location. Interrupted by a sailor she rebuked him. He returned presently with drunken companions and took her "stand." When she attempted to regain it he raised his hand to strike her, when he was promptly manhandled by a "well dressed man wearing a diamond ring" and the onlookers handled the other drunks. Manifestly it had been kind of a meeting, it were nothing but right that disturbers be ousted. The mad Blethen immediately charged the I. W. W. and Socialists with an assault upon the uniform of the army, and published in the same connection the complete speech of Secretary Daniels, saying among other flagophobic ravings that there was no place in this country for followers of the red flag. Blethen has never been able to start so much as a dog fight in the light of day, but with the aid of the secretary of the navy's speech and when the look of night gathered and the carnival spirit was rife and boisterous, the riot, destruction and torching began and with no effort at all to stay it, it continued under the leadership of Blethen's political reporter. Don't blame the soldiers and sailors. Only a handful of them were used as tools by the land mob as a shield for their acts. Put the blame where the blame belongs, upon the secretary of the navy, Mr. Joseph Daniels.

And lastly, don't blame the mob. It is true that there was not a single employer of labor among them. It is true that they were all workers or from the working class. There were a dozen or so half-intoxicated young soldiers and sailors and a hundred or so wildly excited boys and extremely young men whom a half dozen policemen, if they had their "orders," could have stopped. Don't blame the mob. Look back of the mob. Look back of the staging of this lawless "patriotism" and see the material interests of the uneasy employing class.

By the meantime our headquarters are re-established, our book-stores and reading rooms will be reopened and our work is progressing as never before, and emerging Phoenix-like a fine spirit of dead earnest Revolt, from the Cinders and the Smoke.

Remember what the Rev. Kellogg, Ph. D., said last week? He said that no nurses or physicians will be needed after he gets through with Boomer, for there will not be enough left to patch up.
