Materially Cuts Week's Business—Speculative Operations Reduced in Volume. R. G. Dun & Co.'s review of trade says: "A holiday reduced the volume of legitimate business, while speculative operations were seriously curtailed by the general closing of exchanges on Friday afternoon to Tuesday morning."

PROJECT ROAD TO CHICAGO.

Prominent Des Moines Capitalists Plan Line from Springfield, Mo. Former Gov. Lon V. Stephens, Dr. Speed Stephens, and Dr. William Woodburn of Des Moines, Iowa, have a plan to build a new railroad from Springfield, Mo., to Chicago by way of Booneville, Mo., to Des Moines, Dr. Woodburn is president of the company which proposes to build the road and which is incorporated in Iowa as the Springfield, Booneville and Northern Railroad Company.

Firemen Hurt in Blast.

A fire starting in the Syracuse Silk Company's mill, Syracuse, N. Y., spread to the works of the Will-Bauer Candle Company and completely destroyed both plants and their contents. The loss is more than \$100,000.

Foy Strangled by Long Towel.

Carl Hoover, a 13-year-old boy, met death by strangulation at his home on the Troy pike, near Dayton, Ohio. Young Hoover was making ready to attend the carnival in Dayton and while drying his face with the long towel he became entangled in its folds.

Boy's Horrible Fate.

The 12-year-old son of C. A. Gummer, living near Moscow, Idaho, placed the small end of a powder horn in his mouth and ignited the powder, as he said, to "make a smoke." The inside of his head was reduced to jelly.

Break into Postoffice.

The postoffice at Edmond, Ok., was entered by burglars, the safe blown open and \$885 stolen. United States marshals, with bloodhounds, took the trail of the robbers.

Shoos His Neighbor After Trivial Quarrel.

In Nevada, Mo., James B. Ferguson, aged 40, was shot by Hiram Bates, aged 45. The men were neighbors in the suburbs of the town and fell out over a trivial matter.

Fighter Hurt by Explosion.

At Memphis, Tenn., Jimmy Casey, a featherweight pugilist, who is known throughout the West and South, was fatally injured by the explosion of a gas tank.

Thirteen Bodies Recovered.

Seven of the thirteen bodies that have been entombed since June 10, when the explosion in the coal mine of the Pittsburgh Coal Company at Port Royal, Pa., took place, have been recovered.

Laborer Caught a Fallure.

The laborer steamer Home confirmed the report of the failure of the fishery along the northern section of that coast.

Earth 'Wellows a Mountain.

The steamer Tartar brings news that a mountain in northern Japan disappeared after an earthquake. It rose over 500 feet in height and covered forty acres, at the outskirts of the village of Kawayama. It sank with a tremendous thundering noise.

Diamond Rings Are Stolen.

Detectives are trying to find the person or persons who carried off \$10,000 worth of diamond rings from a show case in the store of Schlesinger & Mayer in Chicago.

That's 'Body Is Identified.

A body found floating in the lake near Ashtabula, Ohio, by William Slocum, a farmer boy, has been identified as that of Dr. C. W. Hoyt of Corning, N. Y., who disappeared from a Cleveland and Buffalo passenger boat on the night of July 23.

Teachers Enter a Protest.

The newly arrived American teachers at a mass meeting in Manila have decided to cable to the President, complaining that they were promised commissary privileges and that they now find their expenses are double what they were assured they might expect.

Dallas, Texas. The combination baggage and express case was cut in two and the body of the mail clerk, A. E. Jackson, of Waco, was found buried under the cab of the freight engine, which was overturned and badly wrecked.

SAW PICTURE OF LOST GIRL.

Mother and Daughter Reunited Through Photographer's Exhibit. A photograph exhibited among hundreds of others at the exhibition of the New England Photographers' Association held at Copple Hall, Boston, has reunited a daughter and a mother who had searched for her for years. The other afternoon among the crowd was a middle-aged woman dressed in mourning. She was alone, and was examining, with somewhat listless attention the pictures on the wall.

DRIVES HUSBAND TO DEATH.

Unwarranted Jealousy in the End Responsible for Two Fatalities. A few days ago Charles Shepherd of Toledo, Ohio, came home and found that his wife had hanged herself. She left a note saying she had heard that he was about to elope with another woman and that she loved him so much she could not endure the thought of desertion.

Sultan Orders Her Release.

The American missionary woman who was captured by brigands in the District of Djunabala, in the Vilayet of Conlonia, Turkey, was Miss Ellen H. Stone. The Sultan, immediately upon hearing of the abduction of Miss Stone and her companion, peremptorily ordered the Vali of Salonica to secure her release and to exercise every care for their comfort and safety.

Collision Costs Seven Lives.

Five men were killed and six others seriously injured, two of whom have since died, in a collision which occurred at Jamestown, N. D. A mixed train on the Northern Pacific Railroad came in from Oakes, carrying seventeen men on a flat car. As the train passed the station a road engine was struck, and the force of the collision caused the flat car to collapse.

New Treaty with Britain.

It is reported in Washington on good authority that arrangements have been completed in London for a new treaty to take the place of the defeated Hay-Pauncefote compact and that everything is now ready for its formal drafting. This will be done by the British foreign office, Lord Pauncefote and Ambassador Choate.

Sixty Poisoned at Banquet.

Nearly sixty persons who attended the banquet at the opening of the new Seventh precinct police station in Cleveland suffered from ptomaine poisoning. It is believed that either the clams or the ice cream contained the poison.

Skeleton Found Buried in Alley.

A. Dinkel, a florist, while making an excavation in a vacant alley and the heart of Brazil, Ind., unearthed the skeleton of a man who evidently had been murdered and buried there years ago. A large hole was found in the skull.

Last Insurgent in Leyte Surrenders.

Gen. Hughes' campaign in the island of Leyte has resulted in the surrender of the insurgent Col. Pacheco with his entire command. This ends the insurrection on that island.

Boer Commando Is Captured.

Letters' entire commando has been taken by Maj. Seobell, south of Petersburg. One hundred and three prisoners were captured, twelve Boers were killed and forty-six wounded.

Tornado in Nebraska Town.

A tornado at Benkelman, Neb., destroyed the United Presbyterian Church, many stables and windmills, and partly wrecked several houses. No lives were lost.

Columbia Will Make the Race.

The yacht Columbia, champion of 1890, has been chosen to race against the Shamrock II. in defense of the America's cup.

H. O. Armour Is Dead.

H. O. Armour, the multimillionaire packer of Chicago and New York, died very suddenly at Saratoga, N. Y.
