CARTER SNUFFED OUT.

Chicago's Mayor Is Eliminated from Illinois Politics and All His Ambitions Go Glimmering.

John P. Hopkins, Chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee, Selects His Lieutenants.

He Takes Occasion to Leave All of Harrison's Friends Out in the Cold.

Only One Supporter of the "Man of Destiny" Recognized, Namely, Alderman Thomas Carey.

Action of State Committee Said by Leaders to Mean Absolute Retirement of Harrison.

The Illinois Democracy has put the final touch to the work of retiring Mayor Harrison from politics.

The "dishing" of Carter H. Harrison by John P. Hopkins, it will be seen by a glance at the make-up of the committees as given above is complete.

It is perhaps without a parallel in its way in the history of Democratic politics in Cook County or the State of Illinois.

Defeated ignominiously for even the poor honor of a membership on a political committee, beaten, too, on a stand-up fight before a convention of the members of his party, representing the party of the entire State at that, refused the honor of a place in the councils of the Democracy of his own State, Harrison yet had the audacity to attempt to dictate to a body of which he was not a member, as to who should be its presiding officer. In that Harrison was again most

Mr. Harrison's attempt to eliminate him as a political factor in this community was still fresh in his memory, and the Democrats of Illinois, indignant at the insolent attempted dictation of Chicago's alleged Mayor, were ready for anything that would act as an extinguisher to the ardent flame of the self-styled "man of destiny."

So Chairman Hopkins completely eliminated Harrison and Harrisonism from the Democratic party politics of Illinois, and put an effectual and insurmountable obstacle to the vaulting ambitions of Chicago's political accident.

That there is a possibility that the Legislature may be controlled by the Democrats as a result of the coming elections and the activity of Senator Mason, who seeks re-election, there is no gainsaying. The friends of Mr. Hopkins are already crying out "party loyalty" in fear and trembling, for the reason that they know the friends of Senator Mason can place in the field independent candidates for the Legislature who can command sufficient votes to defeat the regular Republican nominees in several districts, even if that meant the election of a Democrat to the United States Senate. The best friends and supporters of the regular party organization, men who are at the same time the bitterest enemies of Senator Mason, are just now very loudly proclaiming that Mr. Mason will stand by party lines and will not countenance the idea of independent candidacies.

These declarations, however, are born of apprehension, and will not weigh very heavily with Mr. Mason or his friends. They are accepted, it is said, with small appreciation, and there is in the air a feeling that the policy of the Mason wing of the Republican party will be to throw the United States Senatorship to the Democrats if merit, honesty and ability in office is refused recognition by the Republicans.

It is because of these circumstances that the squealing of Carter Harrison by the Democracy of Illinois comes home so bitterly. "The Man of Destiny" has always had his eye upon the United States Senatorship, but it is now dollars to doughnuts that he will not be given even the honorary compliment of a minority nomination. The downfall of Harrison in the field of Democratic State politics will be followed beyond doubt by his elimination as a leader from the field of local Democratic politics.

Two independent Republican candidates for the Legislature are to be brought out at once by Senator Mason's friends.
