

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MUNICIPAL NEWS

Some Items of Interest From the Public Offices About Occurrences of the Week.

The first step toward beautifying the city along the line laid out by the Chicago Plan Commission was taken Tuesday with the decision to construct a boulevard bridge at Twelfth street.

The Sanitary District Trustees decided that the condemned bridge should be replaced by a \$400,000 structure, 100 feet wide, to conform with the proposed boulevard.

The Sanitary District agreed to bear one-half the expense. Alderman Harry E. Littler and L. E. McGann, Commissioner of Public Works, agreed to bring the matter before the City Council next Monday, with the view of having the city bear the other half.

The first through street car route to be opened in State street was started Monday morning. The cars leave South State street and Thirty-ninth streets, run north in State street to Madison and then west to the city limits. At Thirty-ninth street south-bound passengers can obtain transfers for cars leaving that point for the southern limits of the city.

Four assistants for Chief Probation Officer John W. Houston were appointed Tuesday by the Municipal Court Judges. It will be the duty of the new appointees to take personal charge of men and women released by the Municipal Court, as provided in the new adult probation law. Those chosen are J. G. Bradley, 7001 South Park avenue; John B. Ready, 14 North Prairie avenue, Austin; Joseph A. W. Rees, 4713 Kenmore avenue, and John Kadic, 2313 Marshall boulevard. The salary was fixed at \$100 a month.

Chicago wastes from 300,000,000 to 400,000,000 gallons of water every day. From one-half to two-thirds of all the water pumped in Chicago is actually lost.

Twenty thousand four hundred and one men, women and children Monday evening began their studies at the opening of the fall term of the public night schools in Chicago elementary and high schools. Of this number 7,872 attended the high schools, and it is estimated that more than half the pupils are foreigners studying the English language. The increased attendance is attributed to a broadening in the scope of night school work to such an extent that a working knowledge of industrial trades can be obtained as well as commercial and household courses for those who desire to increase their efficiency along these lines. Both high school and elementary grade work is taken up at the schools, while at the technical schools special attention is given to trades and vocational courses.

These facts were reported on Tuesday by a subcommittee of the City Council water committee, which has devoted the summer months to a study of the water problem. The causes of the waste are given as underground leakage of water mains; leakage from faulty plumbing, and careless and unnecessary use of water by consumers who pay on a frontage basis.

The waste of water will be made the subject of special investigation by the aldermen. The rated pumping capacity from the combined stations amounts to 635,210,000 gallons per twenty-four hours. The maximum pumping capacity for the same length of time is 686,710,000 gallons. Although it would appear that Chicago has a system equipped to furnish an abundance of water at all times, the subcommittee declares that the water shortage in many localities causes actual suffering every summer.
