Harry Goldman of the Baltimore Federals obtained Plank's signature to a new league contract after a visit to the pitcher's home at Gettysburg, Pa. FOOTBALLERS ADVISED TO EAT LOTS OF SUGAR

Football players should carry a lot of lump sugar during games and put a lump in their mouths every few minutes of play, if they would try to maintain their strength, in the opinion of Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, former chief chemist of the federal department of agriculture. In a letter to the Harvard Alumni Bulletin Docor Wiley said there was no common food so quickly available for emergency as sugar.

HISTORY OF SOCCER IS TOLD

Former President of Leland Stanford University Tells of Foundation and Growth of Game.

Dr. David Starr Jordan, former president of the Leland Stanford university, who attended the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Football Association of England, which introduced the game of soccer football, narrates the foundation and growth of organized soccer football as follows:

"As the game was founded in London, it is quite natural that the men associated with it should belong to London and the south of England. In those days there was but one or two clubs in the north, but London was really the center of all football and associated with schools and old boys' institutions.

"Hacking was a recognized feature of the game, and when it was proposed to abolish hacking, or kicking and tripping, it was argued that all the pluck and courage of the game would be at an end.

"In 1867 a number of Sheffield players organized an association of their own, and the game came to be played almost as much in the north as in London. Intercity matches began at this time, and the players were distinguished principally by the vigor of their tactics.

"The first international match was played in 1872 between England and Scotland, and immediately thereafter numerous clubs sprang up all over the country. Professionalism was legalized when it was seen that the professional player was inevitable in the city clubs, and from that time the game made great strides. The crowds at the final matches grew from thousands to tens of thousands, and every town supported its team."

Billiards Aid Ford. According to a friend of Russ Ford, probably the greatest developer of the spitball and originator of the emery ball, Russ conceived the idea of throwing these exceptional foolers after studying the way billiard balls curve when the english is applied. Ford's latest success, the "swivel" or "corkscrew" ball, is also derived from the study of the curving and twisting of the ivories on a billiard table.

Hinkey at Yale. Whether Hinkey will return to Yale next fall depends apparently upon Hinkey himself. The general feeling at New Haven is that the silent coach has established a basis for future Yale success and that he is the man upon whom the blue must depend for athletic redemption. The crushing defeat by Harvard may be the queer means to reach a given end.

MEN TO DEFEND DAVIS CUP


Norman E. Brookes and Anthony F. Wilding Have Made Last Stand for International Trophy.




