HECTOR DURANTE

He was chosen as an Alternate to the Republican National Convention at Philadelphia in 1900 from the First Congressional District of Illinois.

In May 1901 he was appointed by Governor Richard Yates, Secretary of the Illinois State Commission to the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition. Member of Foreign Language Division of the 2nd and 3rd Liberty Loan Campaigns. He is the business manager of the Italian newspaper L'Italia, published in Chicago.
