West Frankfort.—With one man benten to death, many injured and homes of foreigners throughout West Frankfort destroyed by incendiary fires, rioting which started here following a double murder, continued almost unabated until it was stopped by the arrival of detachments of the state militia from Mount Vernon, Cairo, Salem and McLeansboro.

Springfield.—Corn is at a critical stage in Illinois, according to the bulletin of the bureau of crop estimates. Almost no rain has fallen during the week, and due to this fact and the ravages of the chinch bug in central and southern Illinois corn has been deteriorating steadily.


Urbana.—The "U. of I. Trail" is the latest motoring route to be added to the state list. The trail was organized at Villa Grove and will connect, eventually, the Universities of Illinois and Indiana. Part of the route through Illinois is described as straight north from Charleston through Camargo and Villa Grove to Philo and thence to Urbana.

Chicago.—Passengers on the Chicago train over the Pennsylvania railroad, experienced a few moments of a real Jesse James thriller when a lone negro bandit boarded the train at the Englewood station and held up the dining car steward.

Waukegan.—Miss Winifred Gifford of Waukegan was talking phone to her mother, Mrs. K. Thompson of Milwaukee on August 18. A telegram received by the girl from R. B. Miller, also of Milwaukee, who was to be best man, stated that he was leaving immediately for Ashland, Ky., where her fiancé had met death in a train wreck.

Carbondale.—Bankers of 32 southern Illinois counties embraced in the Southern Illinois Development association which was organized recently, agreed to underwrite the association for \$75,000 for a period of three years. The purpose of the association is the development of southern Illinois in all lines of endeavor.



Big and Little Exchanges



SWEITZER CALENDAR

Here is a taxpayers' calendar for taxpayers compiled by County Clerk Robert M. Sweitzer. In brief it is as follows: Aug. 1—Tax sale of real estate begins. Penalty for redemption tax sales may be as high as 6 per cent, added to taxes or assessments each six months after sale. Property may be redeemed any time within two years after sale at office of county clerk.

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
