Religious Service—Editor Mitchell in Boston—Interesting Items.

BOSTON, MASS. March, 28th '94.
Rev. Royal H. Brown lectured Thursday evening in the 12th Baptist Church to a fair audience. His subject being, "The Negro and his achievements down to the present."
Easter exercises were conducted at the following Churches. At the Ebenezer Rev. E. J. Brown, at the 10th, and Rev. J. A. Kirk in the evening. In the morning the funeral of Mr. Miles was preached by Rev. P. Smith. At the Charles St. Church the principal sermon was the Annual Sermon to the Lewis Hayden Com-mandery in the evening by the pas-tor, Rev. D. P. Roberts, assisted by Rev. J. H. Carter, G. E. Morris and John Mitchell Jr. Also made short addresses. At the Zion Church very appropriate services were conducted in the evening. Rev. T. H. Johnson delivered an excellent sermon on the subject of "The Resurrection of the Dead." At Calvary Baptist Church the exercises were held at 1:30, at which time short addresses were made by the Supt. Mr. Simms, Rev. W. H. Scott, J. M. Burrell, and John Mitchell, Jr. Miss Riley delivered an excellent solo. The usual services were held in the afternoon and evening. At St. Paul Baptist Church no preparation was made for display with the exception of the music by the choir which was very good under the management of Mr. John Jones. The pastor Rev. F. Smith de-livered two excellent practical ser-mons, but to small congregations. Mr. John Mitchell, Jr. Editor of the Richmond PLANET arrived in the city Friday morning much to our surprise, and after some persuasions consented to stop over until Sunday night. Mr. John M. Burrell took him in charge and they visited many places of interest and met a host of friends. He left the city on the midnight train Sunday for N. Y. He was escorted to the depot by Messrs. Burrell, Morris, Stevens, Morgan, and Forbes.

The difficulty between the men occurred in Buck Spotswood's saloon, and an account was published in yesterday morning's Dispatch. Muse testified that he was standing by the pigeon-hole table near Bacon's Quar-ters. He had only a few words when Christian drew his knife and slashed Muse quite mercilessly. After the cutting, Muse asked, Chris-tian begged him to keep quiet about the affair, as he had mistaken him (Muse) for some one who had insulted him near Bacon's Quar-ters. He stated that Muse provoked him to do it.

GRiffin—Died at his residence, 1222 Buchanan St., Friday morn-ing, March 16, 1894, in the seventy-fourth year of his age, Mr. Valentine Griffin. Deceased was born of free parents in Charles City County, Va., worked as hireling until he became twenty one years of age. He removed to the County of Henrico, and there remained until the begin-ning of the Civil War. He was pressed into the service of the Con-federates in the year of 1862, and placed upon the lines of the army. Near the close of the year 1863, he left the Confederates and went to the Union Army, and was placed in charge of the Commissary, where he remained until the close of the war. He was with the Sherman Division in the far South, and it was some time after the surrender before he returned. In 1866 he moved to his late re-sidence in this city.
